3,000 items on display at museum

Of the more than 3,000 articles on display at Huronia Museum which opened May 17 for its 28th year, are over 2,500 from communities of this

Virtually all the displays are local in nature. Featured in the museum, at the east end of Little Lake Park, Midland, is a one-man whip saw brought from Fifeshire, Scotland, in 1831, by the late John Jamieson, pioneer settler of the Bass Lake area. It was given to the museum by David Dunn of Medonte Township.

An even earlier visitor to Huronia was John Graves Simcoe, first Lt. Governor of Upper Canada after whom the County of Simcoe was named. He is featured in a painting in the lobby of Huronia Museum, Little Lake Park, Midland.

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
