Hanelt was married and his wife is listed by the police as living in Seville, on Long Island in New York State. Hanelt was reported to be planning to move down to the U.S. in the near future.

## Industrial show may be cancelled

Penetanguishene's industrial trade show may have bit the dust before it ever got off the ground.

That's what Hans Rick, the man responsible for co-ordinating the show on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce, indicated recently.

The industrial show was scheduled to be held on July 28 at the community Centre but Rick

reports that the response from area industries is less than encouraging.

The concept behind the show, which was born at the Chambers' annual meeting earlier this year, was not only to have local industries display their products but also show how the products are manufactured.

A minimum of six or seven industries is needed in order for the show to go ahead but to date only one of the three industries, Hans Rick has spoken to have indicated an interest in the show.

The cost for exhibiting an industrial display would be \$250, for floor space Rick said.

If the show is to become a reality industries in-

terested in participating will have to contact Hans

Rick at least a month before the event.

## Glendon's new principal coming here

David McQueen, a 48-year-old bilingual economist, has been named as the new principal of York University's Glendon College. And one of the first stops he will make since his appointment was announced will be the Penetanguishene-Midland area on June 12-14. McQueen officially takes over from outgoing principal Albert Tucker, whose term expires this summer, on July 1, but he said Monday that he had explicit directives from

York's president, Ian MacDonald, to further develop the college's contacts with Franco-Ontarian groups, particularly in North Simcoe.

This summer, the college is offering at least two university credit courses that will be taught at Penetanguishene's St. Joseph's School, and

planning will start soon for next fall's academic offerings.

McQueen, head of the college's economics department since the fall of 1969, was with the Economic Council of Canada for four years, and on the Bank of Canada's research staff for 13 years before that. He holds a bachelor of

commerce degree from the University of Manitoba, and MA from Queen's in Kingston, and a PhD from the University of London's London School of Economics.

A staunch supporter of Glendon's bilingual program since he arrived there to teach, McQueen said he is looking forward to developing cultural and recreational contacts between the college and this area as well as an academic program. He will spend his time next month meeting teachers and officials, as well as prospective part-time students in the Midland-Penetanguishene area.
