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
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## A'corking good book for Holmes addicts'out thanks to Dr. Watson

literature. daddy of all crime busters and his unemotional self assurance have endeared him to millions of fans. Not the least of these is his chronicler, Dr. Watson, who followed him about with admiring astonishment as Holmes unravelled clues and knit up solutions.
