McQueen révéla aussi

ceux qui ont besoin des crédits universitaires et aussi pour ceux qui veulent simplement apprendre. Eventuellement, le Collège Glendon, par son programme à Penetanguishene, servira trois secteurs de la population: les gens de l'endroit, les étudiants de Glendon (Toronto) et tous francophones de l'Ontario.

N.I.P. steering committee meets tonight

Penetanguishene's newly appointed N.I.P. steering committee (co-ordinating body for the town's \$300,000 federal grant under the Neighbourhood Improvement Program) is meeting tonight with N.I.P. consultant Ross Raymond and representatives from the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, and the Ministry of Housing.

The meeting is

designed to be a bull session whereby the members of the N.I.P. steering committee will learn just what their job entails. Guidelines for spending the N.I.P. grant money will be discussed during the study session.

While the press has been invited to the 7:30 p.m. meeting at the town council chambers to report the story because the meeting is a study session the public will be excluded.

At a special meeting of the town council last week the N.I.P. steering committee was set up. It is made up of non-voting and voting members. The advisory body which includes the town clerk and civil technicians is without a vote. Six appointed members: a social worker, a recreation official, a member of the town council and the local planning board, the N.I.P. co-ordinator and a


citizen from each of the town's two designated N.I.P. areas, will have a vote.

Town officials have settled on two designated N.I.P. areas - the west end from Centre Street to Park Street including Poyntz and Robert Streets, and the Chatham and Sheridan Street area

at the other end of town.

Only one of these two areas will get the \$300,000 grant to provide parks and certain services. The N.I.P. steering committee will be expected to choose which of the two areas receives the N.I.P. funds and after meetings with the public, on what to spend the money.
