The bookworm

Play with words book

Do you like crossword puzzles? Charades? Games like ghost and Scrabble? Do you dote on Swifties, riddles and puns?

When you read "What a Friend We Have in Cheeses," do you wish you'd said it first?

If you answer "yes" to all the above questions, you'll love *An Almanac of Word At Play*, by Willard R. Espy.

This highly wordbreak will provide paper freaks with a year of literal pleasure. There is an entry for each day of the year - a puzzle, a couple of crazy rhymes, or a piece of humorous writing.

Espy is a writer of light verse, and his pieces have appeared in *Punch*, and in *Good Housekeeping*, among other publications. A few of his verses are scattered through his

Almanac like, "Who loves wisely but too well / On passion's torrent borne / A sadder and a Wasserman / shall rise the morrow morn."

On his way through the year, Espy drops limericks, haiku, graffiti, tongue twisters, epigrams and epigrams. There are palindromes ("Sex at noon taxes"), combined names (if Tuesday Weld married Frederick March 11, she would be Tuesday March 11) and pages of puns ("Oh why Chianti leave me alone?")

Not the least of the pleasures to be found in the book are the many puzzles and word games. Try the flo following rebus - it is the address from a letter that was actually delivered to the right address.

WOOD JOHN MASS
The answer is John Underwood, Andover Massachusetts. All the puzzles in the Almanac have the solutions in the back of the book.

In a column such as this one, it seems appropriate to quote some of Espy's nutty fractured book reviews. "Websters Dictionary, too wordy. Hammond's Atlas, covers too much ground. Handbook of Adhesives - couldn't put it down."

The whole merry collection is indexed by author, which makes it handy as a reference book. In addition, the content of each page is noted in the top corner of that page - cliche, visual word play malapropism or whatever.

The Almanac of Words at Play is a natural for all lovers of language, especially if your love affair is a light hearted one. And if reading it sets you to idly composing self-introductions like "I'm Brown, from the Sun" or "I'm Shakespeare from the Globe." Don't say I didn't warn you.

Happy cooker Cabbage rolls

Midland's Hanna Thomas is one of the best cooks around, and her recipe for cabbage rolls will fill your kitchen with a delicious fragrance. It's the best way I know to make the little darlings.

Ingredients
1 large head of cabbage
1 - 48 ounce can tomato juice
1 clove garlic
1 1/2 pounds minced beef
1 1/4 cups raw rice
2 tablespoons tomato paste
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon paprika
salt and pepper

Method: Carve out thick core from centre of cabbage with sharp knife. Drop cabbage into boiling salted water, core end down. Boil a few minutes until leaves are softened. While boiling loosen each leaf with a long fork and spoon. Remove each leaf and place in dish to cool. When all leaves have been softened, cut out heavy centre stems from each leaf. Do not stuff outer leaves - save for the bottom of the pan. If leaves are extremely large, cut in half. Set aside while you make the filling.

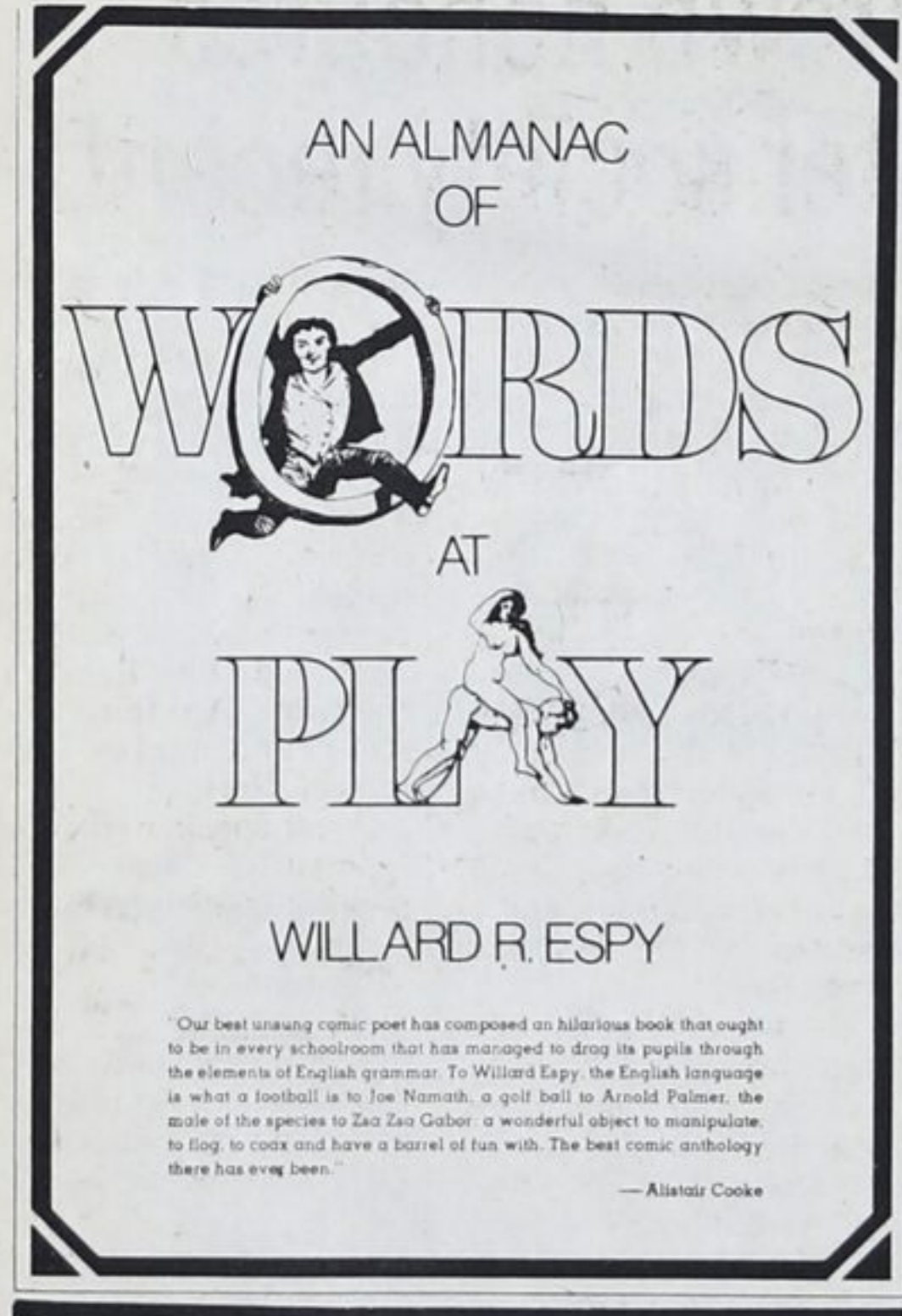
Filling: Boil rice for 5 minutes only. Strain, rinse with cold water and drain again. Place minced beef in a large mixing bowl. Add rice, tomato paste, lemon juice and seasonings. Mix all together, lightly but thoroughly.

Fill each leaf, starting at one end with 1 tbsp. stuffing and roll up like a cigar. When all filling has been used up, place all outer leaves and any leaves left over plus stems of cabbage on bottom of roasting pan. This acts as a base to keep cabbage rolls from scorching.

Cut garlic in half and hide each half under a leaf at each end of the pan. Arrange cabbage rolls, seam side down, on top of leaves and stems, alternating each layer in opposite directions.

Add enough tomato juice to reach top layer. Sprinkle with a little salt. Press down with an inverted china dish. Cover and bake in 300 degree oven for 2 hours. Serve with dairy sour cream. Recipe 6-8.
