Instructor for the course was Carol Ashworth of the Sportsman's Inn, Victoria Harbour. 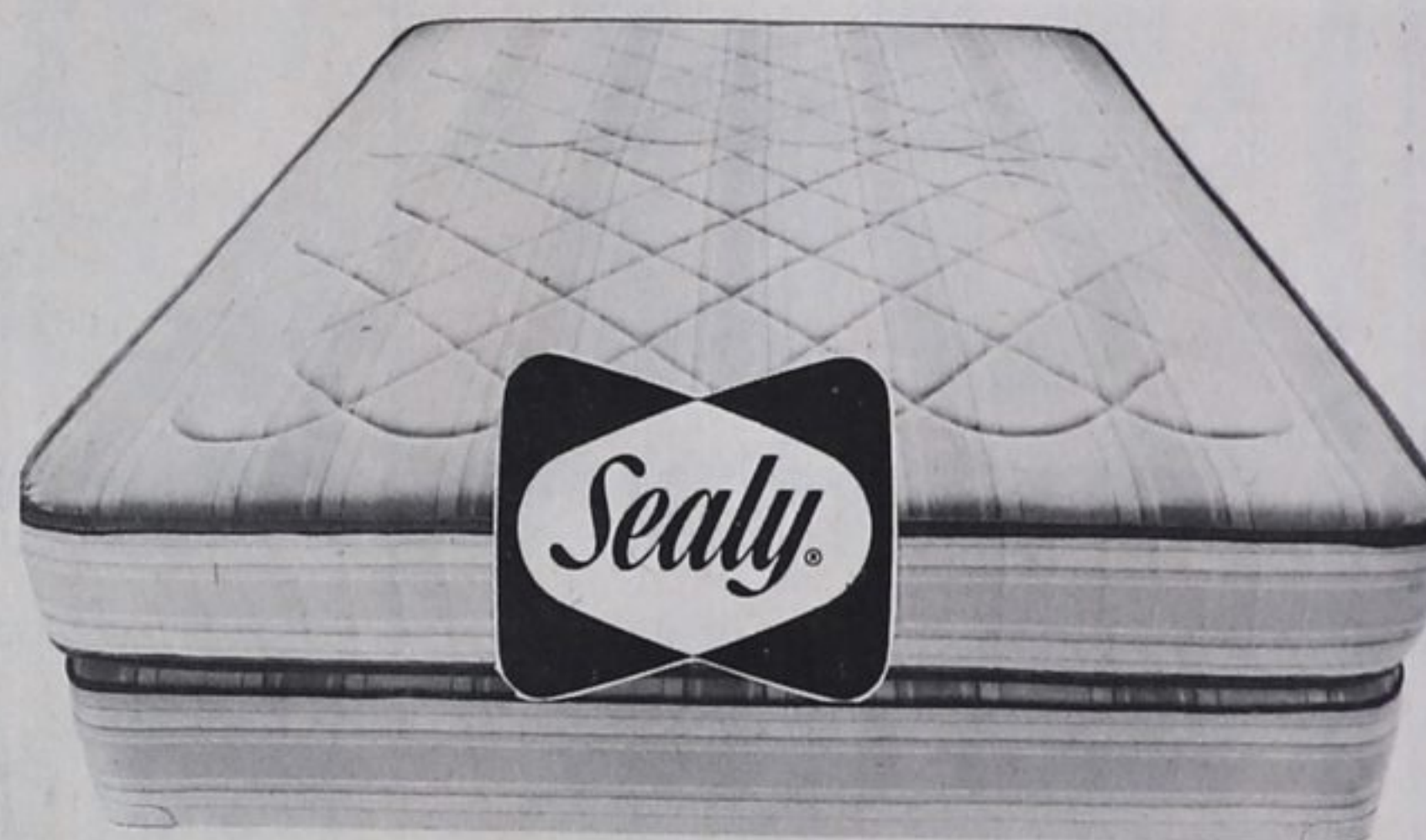

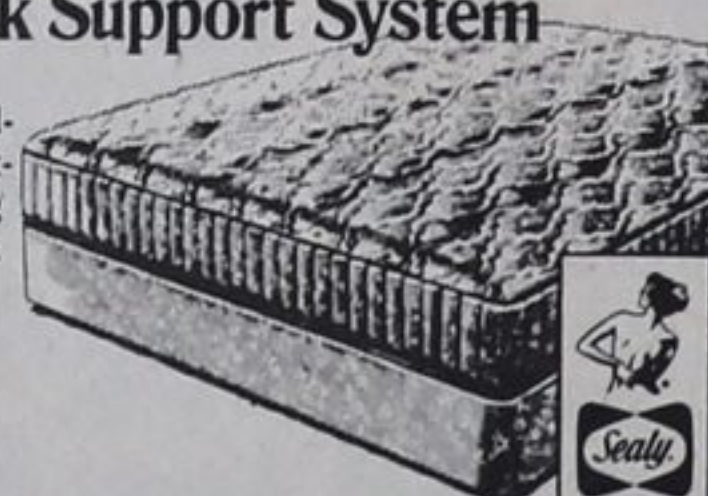

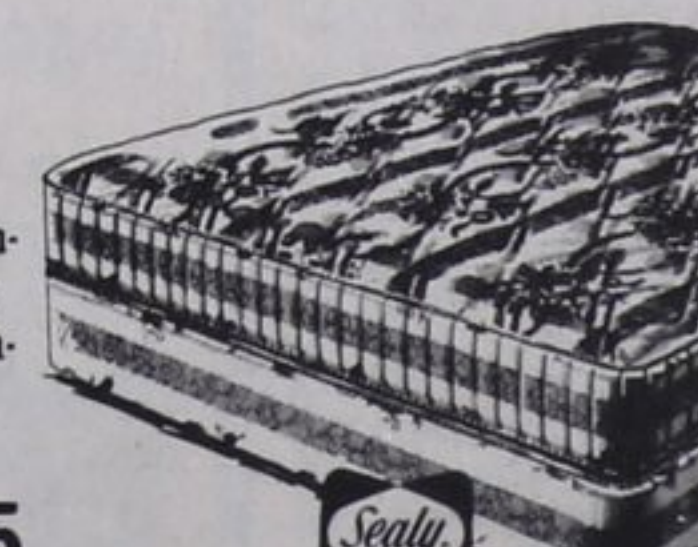
