RC board ends 1975 with \$17,000 surplus

The Simcoe County Roman Catholic Separate School Board received the auditors' report at their last meeting.

The board ended 1975 with a surplus of \$17,000. The board had budgeted a 27 per cent increase in 1975 over 1974.

Two applications for sponsorship of a program under the Ministry of Education's Experience '76 program were received at the meeting.

One of the applicants is from Midland, with the other from Angus. Experience '76 is an attempt by the Education ministry to provide summer work for high school and university students. Pay scales for the program are laid

down by the ministry.

The board approved the applications and sent them to the ministry for their acceptance.

The transportation committee reported that the present transportation scheme was acceptable. The board transports 4,382 students more than 5,000 miles daily. Separate school students are transported by boats, buses, vans, taxis and snowmobiles.

The construction of Monsignor Clair School in Barrie is well underway. The footings have been poured and block laying has been started.

In conjunction with construction, Trustee Saunders reported that parents in the area felt that the St. Vincent and Cundles intersection was dangerous and recommended that the board ask the city to erect stop lights at the corner.

Grove Street East and Cook Street intersection is another area that Saunders felt was dangerous.

Nolin Morrow, principal of Our Lady of Assumption in New Lowell, has been appointed principal of St.

James School in Colgan. Roland Comeau was appointed to replace Morrow as principal at Our Lady of Assumption.

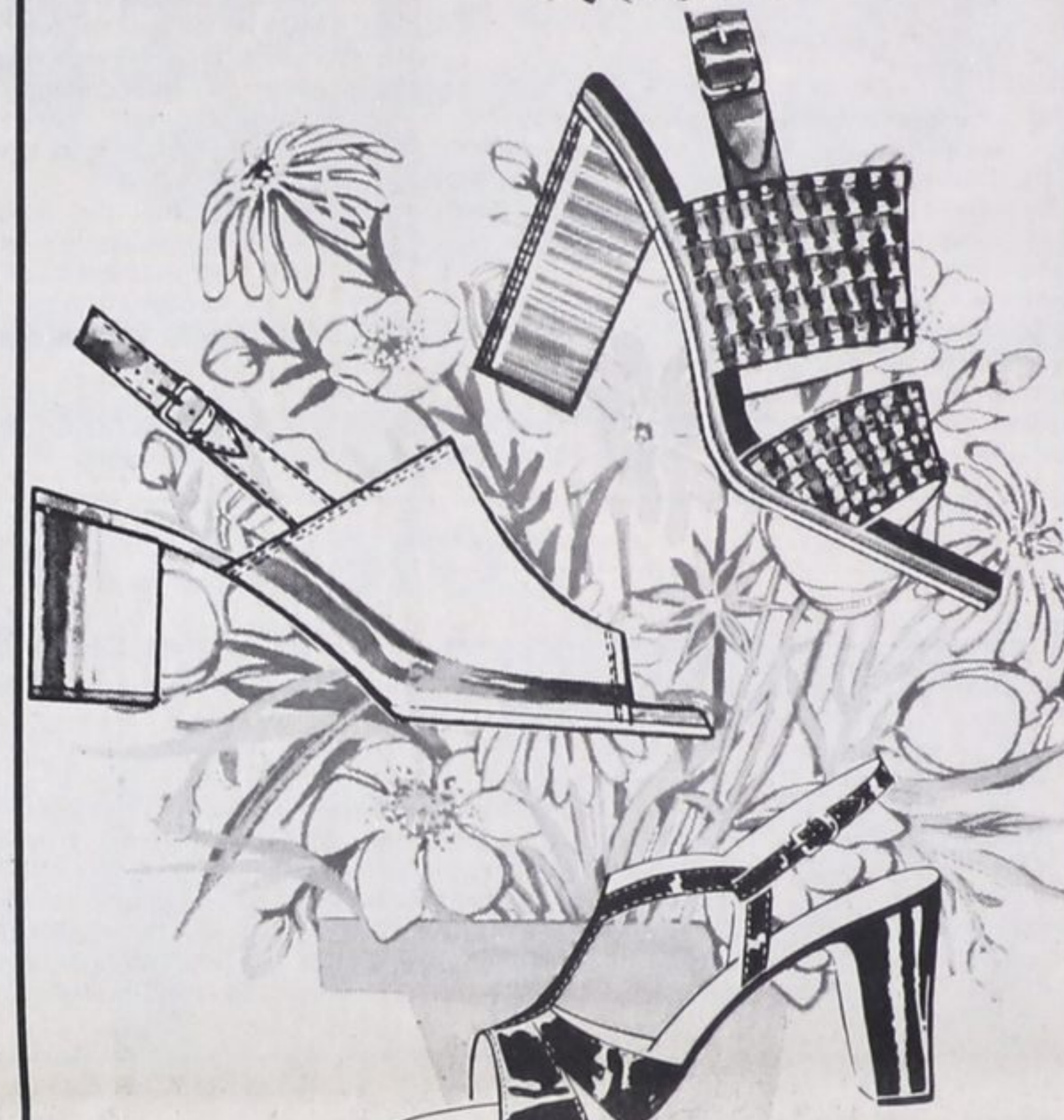
