The United Church Head Office has come under heavy criticism in recent months from farm people across the province for its continuing support of the California grape boycott and for what farmers have interpreted as a one-sided view of food production.

Within the last few weeks the United Church Executive Council's refusal to support farm marketing boards caused renewed criticism. In the May 11 issue of Farm and Country, an Ontario farm paper, former Ontario Minister of Agriculture and Food Wm. A Stewart is quoted "this shilly-shallying (on support of farm marketing boards) is an extension of the church's incredibly stupid support of the California grape boycott". Stewart attributed much of the church's attitude to Rev. Robt. Lindsey and another top official Rev. Clarke MacDonald.
