Midland employees salaries hiked eight per cent

The town of Midland union salaried employees has come to salary agreements with its non-union employees. In a release to the press

at its regular meeting Monday night, council noted that the salaries of non-union staff will be increased eight per cent immediately, and that a further two per cent be submitted to the Anti-Inflation Board for approval. If approved, non-union staff will receive two per cent retroactive to January 1. No member of the non-union staff will receive an increase in excess of \$2,400 per year. The basic salary of the members of the Midland police department will be increased 10 per cent across the board. Court time allowance will be

increased by 10 per cent. The Midland police association and the bargaining committee of council also agreed that in the event that the Anti-Inflation Board denies the salary increase of 10 per cent and requires a lesser salary increase, the increase will be decreased in accordance with the order. Of the ten per cent increase, council has authorized payment of eight per cent with the two per cent payable if and when authorized by the Anti-Inflation Board and retroactive to January 1, 1976. The Midland Firefighters Association negotiated on the same basis as the Midland police association. The salary of Fire Chief Miller, due to his reclassification, was increased to \$18,200 per annum and Deputy-Chief Lemieux to \$17,200. Public works employees have also ratified an agreement with the town, which calls for an increase of 12 per cent, eight per cent of which will be payable now and the remainder subject to the approval of the Anti-Inflation Board.

In provincial court

Impaired driver draws \$200

Gary Cadeau, 22, of 5 Gignac Drive in Penetanguishene, pleaded guilty in provincial court Monday to a charge of unlawfully driving of a vehicle while his licence was suspended. Judge L.T. Montgomery fined the man \$200 with 60 days to pay.

Sentenced and fined Klaus Schwartz, 31, of Midland pleaded guilty Monday to a charge of excess alcohol and impaired driving. He was fined \$200 and sentenced to 15 days in jail.

Building statistics show decrease

Pleaded guilty Cleo J. King, 43, of 10 Robert Lane in Penetanguishene, pleaded guilty to a charge of impaired driving and was fined \$150 Monday in provincial court.

The value of building permits issued in May of this year is down from the comparable 1975 figure. In May of 1975 there were 55 building permits issued for a total of \$894,811. This May, only 13

permits were issued for a total value of \$85,000. To date, 77 permits have been issued for 1976 for a value of \$825,700. Last year during the same period, 90 permits were issued for a value of \$1,414,111.

Tiny to purchase fire engine

The Tiny Township Fire Department will be purchasing a new fire engine to be stationed in Wyebridge.

At a council meeting last week, members decided to buy a fire truck from C.E. Hickey and Sons, for a total of \$38,581.00.

The council had planned to purchase another truck but it had been sold by the time council reached the distributor.

Clerk Guy Maurice said the township is trying to upgrade its fire equipment. The new truck will be used to protect the complex on Highway 27 which includes Dominion and Zellers.

Other business Council received a letter from the Ministry of Culture and Recreation advising it would grant Wyevale Park \$5,036.25 for its new lighting system in the park.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$20,145.00. The remaining

\$15,000 is the responsibility of the township while the Wyevale Recreation Association will match the grant of the government, the municipality has granted \$2,600, and the remainder must be raised by the people of Wyevale. The lights in the park have been installed.

Transit use up

The use of transit to date this year in the area has increased by 135 per cent over last year.

Midland council

learned at its meeting Monday night that revenue from fares collected in May of this year have increased 113 per cent over May of 1975.
