

# Runway resurfacing to begin next week

Work on the resurfacing of the Huronia airport runway will begin next week.

The federal Ministry of Transport last week, awarded the tender for the project to Fisher-Farrand Ltd. of Barrie in the amount of \$64,000.

Other bidders for the project came in at just under \$100,000, while a fourth estimated \$112,000 as its cost for the graveling project.

According to airport commission secretary Guy Maurice, the resurfacing project will necessitate the closing of the airport for the duration.

Jack Shelton, regional manager for public affairs with the Ministry of Transport, estimated that the work would be completed within six weeks.

The graveling project will include the 3,000 foot runway, a 265 foot taxiway and a 200 by 125 foot parking apron.

Disher Farrand were the contractors for a similar project at the Collingwood airport.

# McMurtry speaks to Tories at annual meet

The mandatory seat belt legislation brought in by the provincial government earlier this year is not a scheme to curtail personal freedom, said Attorney-General Roy McMurtry in his speech to the Simcoe East Tories last week in Victoria Harbour.

Instead it is a program to insure that citizens will have a longer opportunity to enjoy their rights, he said.

"I have always placed a high value on the rights of the individual and look with skepticism on government intervention in the lives of citizens," said McMurtry.

He added however, that something had to be done to stop or at least cut down on the number of lives lost in car accidents. Automobile injuries are an enormous expense to the community as a whole and it is in everyone's best interest to try and cut down on them.

People have come to think driving a car is a right but it should be considered a privilege, said McMurtry.

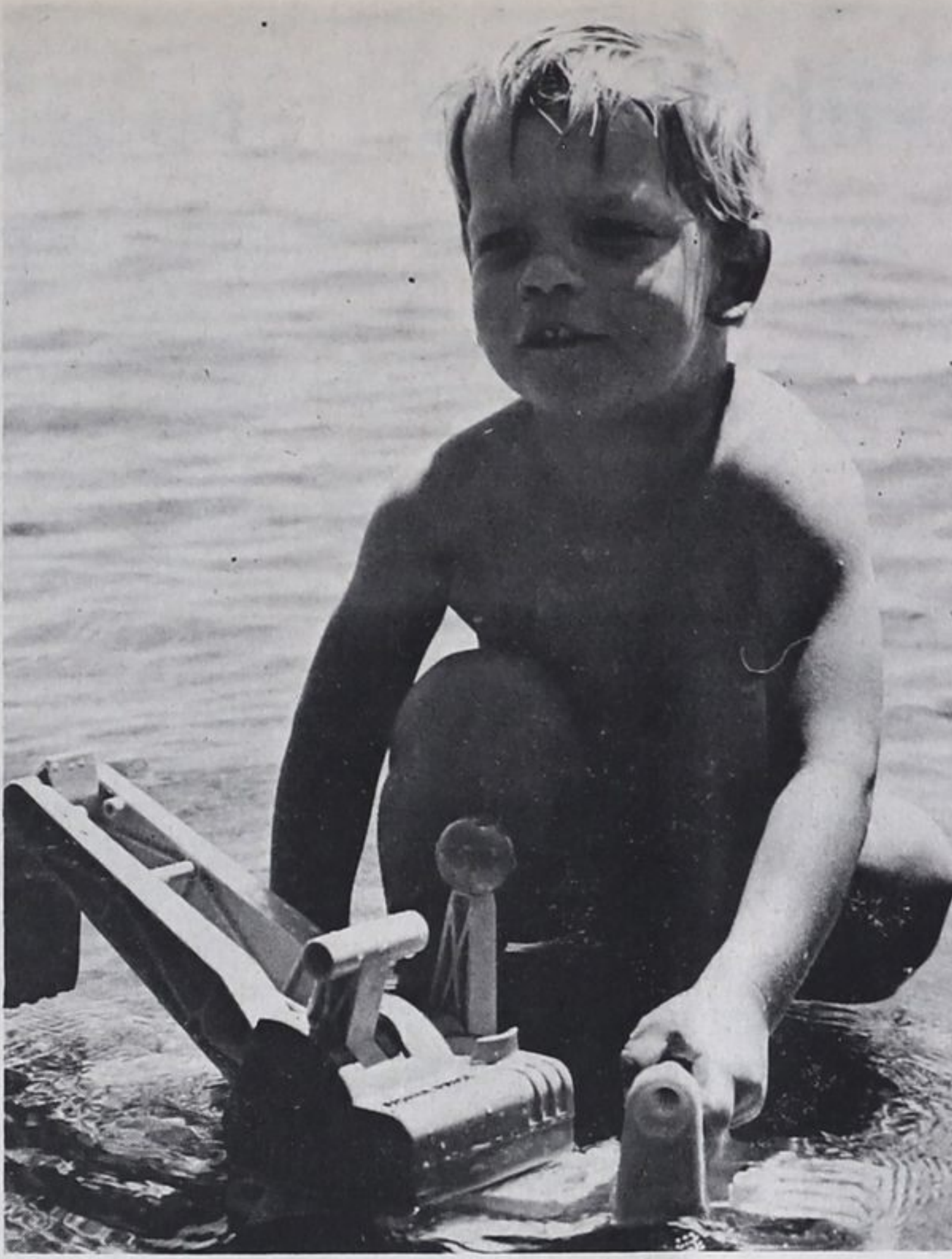
McMurtry defended his action of directing crown attorneys to prosecute those professional athletes who violate the criminal code. He was referring specifically to professional hockey.

He said he feels the hockey arena should be a place where spectators can enjoy one of the world's finest sports without being subjected to violence.

"The fact that such violent conduct has become commonplace doesn't mean it should be tolerated or accepted," said McMurtry.

He told the audience that every individual has the responsibility to be involved in the problems facing our community. "Responsible people," he said, "simply cannot remain detached."

He stressed that every individual should look around and not be reluctant to make a concerned commitment to the world in which he lives.

# Public health nurses will picket tomorrow

Striking public health nurses will be picketing outside the health centre on King Street in Midland tomorrow afternoon.

The 11,000 Ontario public health and registered nurses went on strike Monday to back their demand for compulsory arbitration to end strikes and lockouts.

Arbitration has been proposed by the Public Health Nurses to ensure that the community is never deprived of their service as in the case when a strike or lockout takes place.

Before coming to Midland, the Simcoe County Nurses Association local 37, will be picketing at Queen's Park and then Collingwood. They plan to move on to Midhurst on Friday.

# CMHC okayshousing

Ten family housing units will be built on Fitton Street near Midland Park Lake.

Ninety per cent of the cost of these units will be covered by a \$288,309 loan from the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation to the Ontario Housing Corporation.

This loan and two others, in Collingwood and Kincardine, were announced by Urban Affairs Minister Barney Danson last week.

The development will include eight, three-bedroom row houses and two, four-bedroom, semi-detached units.

Rents will be geared to the tenants incomes with annual operating subsidies, estimated at \$34,578, being shared equally by CMHC and OHC.

# All night restaurant may close doors for early morning hours

The Donut Factory, an all night restaurant on Yonge Street may be forced to close its doors from 2 a.m. to 6 a.m.

A bylaw is before council to restrict the hours of such restaurants because they tend to become hangouts for those who have nothing to do with themselves during the wee hours of the morning, according to Midland councillors.

Complaints have been received by the police about the noise coming from the Donut Factory early in the morning.

Police Chief Ernie Bates said it is not what the clientele do when inside the restaurant, but rather when they get outside.

The police receive many complaints from the nearby motels concerning the squealing of tires.

Solicitor for the owner of the Donut Factory, said the owner is doing what he can to keep the place from becoming a hangout for undesirables. He said he felt there was a need for such an all-night restaurant in Midland.

Reeve Lynn suggested the restaurant be closed on weekends between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. but solicitor Drummond Peet said this is prime money making time for the Donut Factory.

Council said they hope an arrangement can be made to keep down the noise without closing the restaurant.
