200 Orange Lodgers on parade

More than 200 Orange Lodges from across the province gathered in Collingwood last Saturday for the 286th annual celebration of the Battle of the Boyne.

Loyal Orange Lodges, Juvenile Orange Lodges, Ladies' Orange Benevolent Associations and Loyal True Blue Lodges from places such as Owen Sound, Beaver Valley, Glen Huron, Elmvalle, Orillia,

Orangeville and other places, as well as the host Collingwood Victoria L.O.L. 943 lined up in a two-mile long parade.

The entourage took 50 minutes to pass any given point along the route with pipe bands from the Collingwood, Stayner, Brampton and Orillia providing music along with several of the lodges' pipe and drum bands. The Dundalk J.O.L. Boy's Pipe Band and the Beaver Valley Pipe Band also played in the parade.

The lodge that travelled the farthest distance was Garson L.O.L., a town in the Nipissing area. The oldest Orangeman in the parade was William Gould from the Alliston area, who has been a member for 64 years.

Orangeville took the honours as having the best pipe and drum band over 10 pieces while Glen Huron took the same award for a pipe and drum band under 10 pieces.

The Collingwood Legion Branch 63 was named the

best Pipe Band and Woolsley was named the best dressed Loyal True Blue Lodge. Woodbridge was the best dressed L.O.L. and Orillia was selected as the best L.O.B.A. Udney L.O.L. had the best banner.

Judges for this, the biggest Orange Parade ever held in Collingwood were B.J. Hill, William Malley, Doug Hammond and Roy Nevils.

Guest speakers at Collingwood's Exhibition Park after the parade

included Mayor Harry Bell, Past Master of Victoria L.O.L., George McCague; Canon Wally Downer, Grace McRae, Grand Mistress of Grand Orange Lodges of L.O.B.A. for Ontario West and W.J. Miller, past Grand Master of the Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West.

Following the speeches, a ball game was played by crippled children at the park diamond. The Orange Lodge stands for Civil and

Religious Liberty for all, equal rights for all and special privileges for none.

Collingwood Mayor Harry Bell sees Orange Lodges as a safety valve for freedom of speech and religion.

Orange Lodges support hospitals, orphanages, homes for senior citizens; the Canadian National Institute for the Blind and the Salvation Army.

Next year's Orange parade will be held July 7 in Beeton.

Raise sewer problems

At a regular meeting of council Monday night, representatives from Ontario Street confronted council asking what was to become of their serious problem of having no sewers systems.

Council informed the delegation that the delay was not intentional but that the petition signed by the Ontario Street residents had been lost. Clerk Bill Hack

apologized for the misplaced document and said he hoped they could get the situation cleared up as fast as possible and inquired whether it would be possible for the group to gather up more signatures for another petition to present.

The clerk said he would have the solicitor draw up the two construction bylaws affecting the residents, and he hoped

this could be done within the week. If the bylaws are drawn up, council will hold a special meeting next Monday night to meet again with the residents.

Hack said there is no reason why tenders for the job cannot be called as long as there is the understanding that no construction can begin without first getting approval from OMB.

No condominium objection

The technical committee of the Midland council has no objections to the proposal for a condominium apartment to be built on town land lots 111 and 112, on

Concession two, near the area known as Portage Park.

The conditions of the approval are that the proposed building is fully maintained by the

condominium corporation and that if and when the area is serviced by municipal sewers, the project must be connected to it.

The agreement for

approval of such a sewer system must contain a clause to make it clear that the municipality will not be responsible for the aerobic sanitary system which will service the condominium.
