

Port granted \$31,360

The village of Port McNicoll has been allocated a grant of \$31,360 under the Ontario Home Renewal Program (OHRP).

The grant to the village was only a part of the \$1,010,988 to be divided between 26 Ontario municipalities. The grants were announced recently by housing

minister John Rhodes. Reeve Bruce Dockray said the grant allocated to Port McNicoll has been pretty well used up already this year. This is the second year the program has been running and Port McNicoll has applied for and received grants each time.

"We have been ex-

tremely fortunate," said the reeve.

The sum allocated to the village is enough to repair about six or seven homes he said.

"That amount of money goes pretty fast when you're talking about repairing homes," said Dockray.

The Ontario Home Renewal Program

provides per capita grants to Ontario municipalities, to administer directly as loans to homeowner occupants to repair their houses to an acceptable minimum standard.

The prime objective of the program is the correction of faulty structural and sanitary conditions and the upgrading of plumbing, heating and electrical systems of the owner

occupants home.

"OHRP is directly oriented to low and moderate income homeowners with a maximum annual income of \$12,500," said the housing minister.

Loans of up to \$7,500 can be given to eligible owner occupants to bring their homes up to the standards adopted by their municipality.

A portion of the loan can be "forgiven"

depending upon the income of the recipient. Interest rates vary from zero to eight per cent, again depending on income.

OHRP extends home renewal possibilities to owner occupants in any municipality in Ontario, rural or urban, which has adopted either a minimum housing standards bylaw or a resolution setting such standards.

Ontario Peaches

Ontario peaches are in the shopping areas and roadside areas right now and you have got to agree they are tops in flavour. They are ideal for eating fresh, delicious in summer salads and mouth watering in freshly baked pies, cobbblers and sauces.

Freestones, ready in mid-August, are an Ontario tradition noted for their superior and all-round versatility.

For preserving your best choice is the Freestone peach. Redhaven, Envoy, Loring, Madison and Veteran are among the best for both freezing and preserving.

You should sort your peaches before using. Keep your underripe peaches at room temperature, uncovered and not in direct sunlight. Refrigerate ripe peaches, uncovered for up to five days. Remove any peaches that are bruised or are beginning to spoil and use immediately.

There has just been a new pamphlet put out by our Ministry entitled "Peach Power". In it there are super recipes for peach pancakes, jam, pie and peach chili sauce.

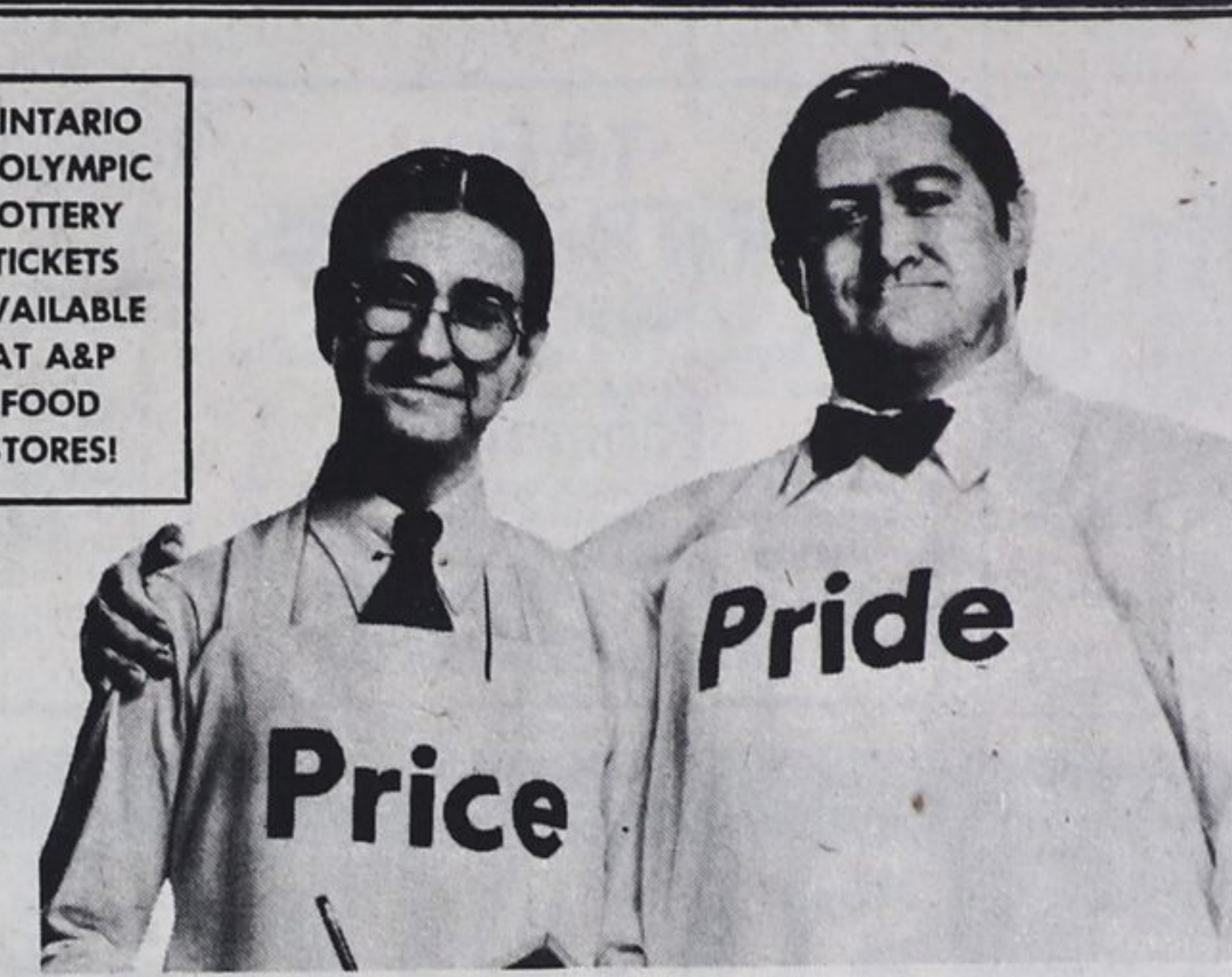
