Bobby Orr - Mike Walton squad goes down to defeat

Lights are switched on last Thursday

The Georgian Bay All-Stars defeated a team from the Bobby Orr - Mike Walton Sports Camp by a score of 7-6 last Thursday evening, in a game which brought the McGuire Park Light Fund \$525 closer to its objective of \$7,800.

The amount now remaining to be collected is about \$600.

Part way through the game, the lights were turned on for the first time by Frances St. Amant, standing behind home plate. Speeches were delivered by Ron Marchildon, Ron Bellisle and Mayor Vince Moreau before the lights came alive in a blaze of glory. After a period of about five minutes of warming up the lights bathed the diamond with light which was strong enough to read by anywhere on the field.

The game featured good play from both sides, but the All-Stars, in danger of swamping the

Bobby Orr team in the early innings, eased off in the latter innings to allow them to make the score respectable.

In the last inning, Penetanguishene "short-stop" Vince Moreau, who was actually acting as third base umpire throughout most of the game, went out on a pop fly.

The children who attended the game were not disappointed by the loss of their hockey superstars, though, as they swamped Orr both before and after the game demanding autographs.

The cruise held Saturday evening on the David Richard to raise money for the fund was somewhat disappointing for the organizers. St. Amant blamed bad weather for the poor turnout but said those who attended had a good, if wet, time.

The cruise, which raised about \$120 to \$125,

and the Bobby Orr game, as well as a few private donations, have left the fund at about \$7,200.

St. Amant said she was hoping the cruise could be the last in the series of special events she has organized for the fund, but said if more private donations were not forthcoming she would have to organize something else, probably another dance. Rick Lemieux has already offered to provide the music for such a dance should it be necessary.

St. Amant said there was still about \$300 owed on the dance-a-thon, and if the children who have the money bring it in, the chore of raising the rest of the money will be easier.

She said she was very grateful to the men from the sports camp who donated their time for Thursday evening's game and did not demand a cut of the profits.

Penetanguishene Juveniles take opener against Minesing

The Penetanguishene Juvenile fastball team took a 1-0 lead in their best two out of three playoff series against Minesing Sunday afternoon with a 3-2 win.

the Juveniles going 5 1/3 innings and striking out one walk, and striking out five batters.

allowed seven hits and one walk, while striking out eight Penetanguishene batters.

Minesing started off the scoring in the top of the first inning when a run came in on an error at first base. In the top of the third Dahmer came through with two critical strike-outs in a row with bases-loaded to prevent what appeared to be two or three sure runs for Minesing.

The winning run came in the bottom of the sixth. In the top of the seventh, Dahmer, who had taken over the second base position when Marchildon took over on the mound, made a beautiful diving catch on a short hit by Mark Laws with a Minesing man in scoring position, to get the third out and prevent the tying run from coming in.

The 3-2 score held up for the rest of the game with the last two innings being three up, three down on both sides.

Penetanguishene won the first game in Penetanguishene by a score of 10-0. They lost a cliff-hanger in Midhurst last Tuesday when Midhurst scored a tie breaking 14th run in the tenth inning to give them a 14-13 victory.

Penetanguishene had 20 hits, three errors, and 11 men left on base in that game. Dave Parent and Ken Marchildon hit home runs, while Ernie Quesnelle got five hits in six trips to the plate.

James Dahmer, Ken Marchildon and Ernie Quesnelle shared the pitching duties, and had a total of six strike-outs.

The winning pitcher was Wayne Orser.

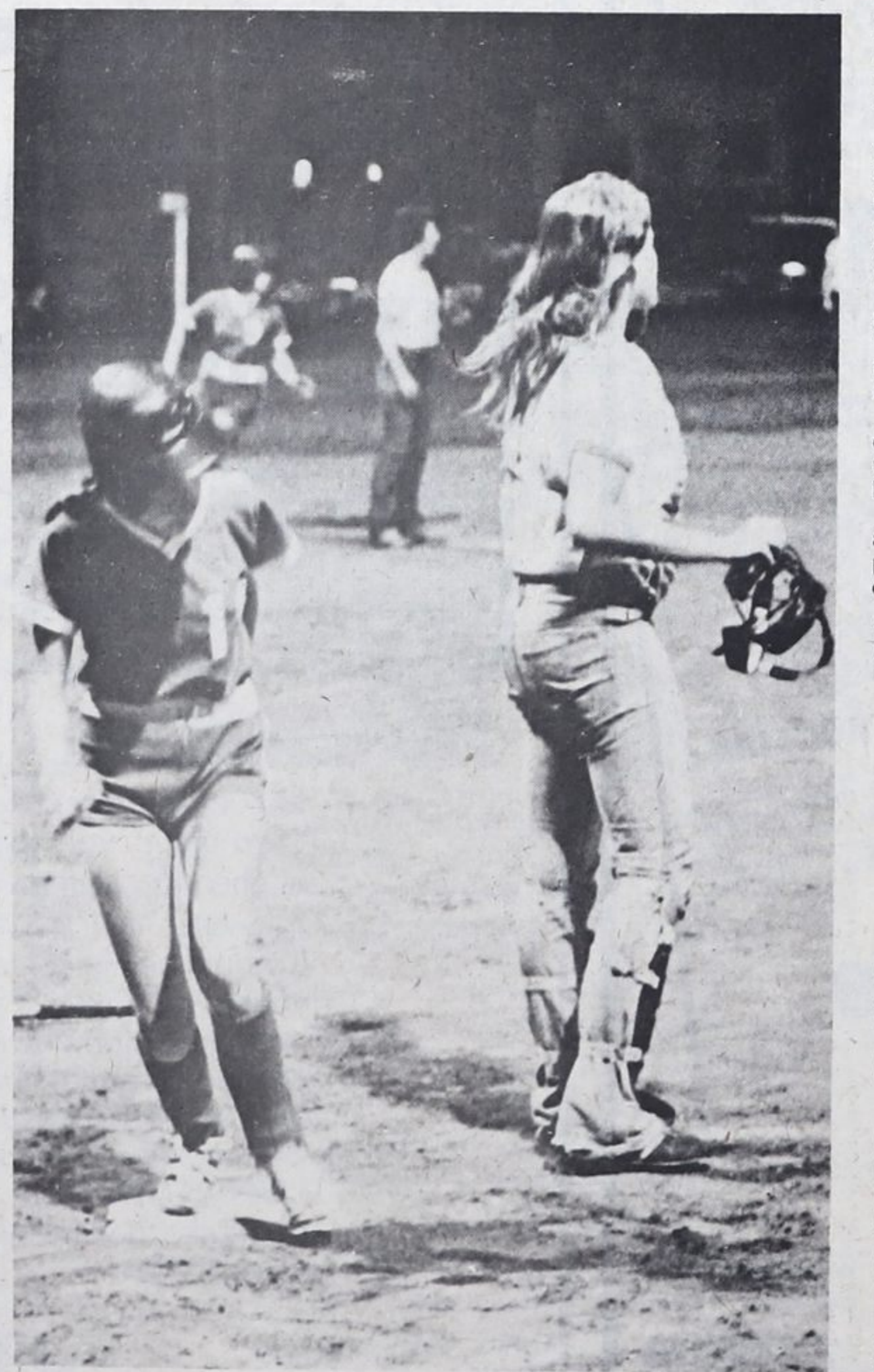
