## Executive meets to discuss legion property

The executive of the Coldwater Memorial Library met last week with Murray Payne, representative of the Coldwater Legion, and Reeve Earl Brandon to discuss the proposed improvements to the Legion property on Main Street and Michael Ann Drive.

The property is contiguous to the south side of the library property. Mr. Payne advised that the plans for the vacant lot included the addition of top soil and sod, and the installation of benches

and a pathway across the lawn to the library property. This would necessitate the removal of the lilac trees now separating the two lots. The Legion also intends to relocate the present cenotaph on Main Street North to the Legion property.

The library executive are concerned about the proposed removal of trees as they feel it will allow too much access to library property. They have postponed giving a final decision until the subject has been more thoroughly discussed. The property behind the

library, between the row of lilac trees, and the Legion building also belongs to the library. Plans are now in progress to add fill to this land and relocate the trees to the back of the property.

During the library board's regular meeting a motion was passed to confirm with Custom Electric the installation of new lighting in the library.

The yearly budget was reviewed and because of a small surplus an additional number of books can be purchased. The book committee is meeting today to choose

the new books. This will include 175 books for juveniles and 375 for adults.

The board members were very pleased with the way the library booth at the Coldwater Fall Fair was enjoyed by the public and they hope to have the booth again next year.

The Coldwater Home Hardware has donated plexiglass to protect the copy of a mid-30's newspaper now on display in the library.
