## Granted discharges

**Petty theft**  
Two Toronto youths were granted conditional discharges in provincial court Thursday, after pleading guilty to three charges of theft under \$200.

John Dowsett, 17, and Michael Bell, 16, were charged along with a third person, after the three stole a total of about 13 gallons of gasoline by siphoning it from three different vehicles.

Dowsett's attorney told the court he had spent about five hours in jail on October 2, the morning of the offense. He said the boys had gone that day to the owners of the cars from which the gasoline had been taken, expressed sincere regret for what they had done, and made restitution. He introduced as evidence a letter from one of the victims, who said the boys were very apologetic, and appeared to have learned their lesson.

Bell's attorney told the court Bell had suffered embarrassment at home because of the arrest, and was suffering embarrassment at having to appear in court. He said the boy wanted to attend Royal Military College in Kingston when he finished high school, and a criminal conviction would severely hamper his chances of getting in.

Judge Montgomery said "I feel they are genuinely remorseful for their conduct," and pointed out to them that he could sentence them each to a total of 18 months in jail on the charges. He then granted them the discharge.

The third accused in the case, Peter Herz, was remanded to December 16 for trial.

**Hit and run**  
Failure to report an accident, and deliberately misleading police, resulted in 30 days in jail and a \$300 fine for a 24-year-old Midland man in provincial court Thursday.

James Caston pleaded guilty to the charges, which resulted following an accident on July 18 at 11:15 p.m. on Champlain Road. The car Caston was driving struck two others, then drove off. The next day, he reported to police that his car had been stolen sometime on the 18th. Police found the car on July 20, and Caston admitted to them that the car hadn't really been stolen, and that he had been the driver on the night of the accident.

Judge Montgomery ordered him to pay \$300 or spend 30 days in jail on the failing to remain charge, and ordered his license suspended for a further six months on top of the mandatory three month suspension. On the charge of misleading the police, he was sentenced to 30 days in jail.

Caston, who is unemployed, asked that he be allowed to serve his sentence intermittently on weekends because his wife is pregnant and is due to give birth in November. The judge said he didn't see how Caston could predict that his wife would give birth on a week day, but allowed the request, and cautioned, "I hope that counsel in court don't take this as a precedent", because he usually does not allow intermittent sentences unless the accused is steadily employed. He said it was a special case.

**Careless driving**  
A 17-year-old Victoria Harbour man was fined \$150 in provincial court Thursday on a charge of careless driving.

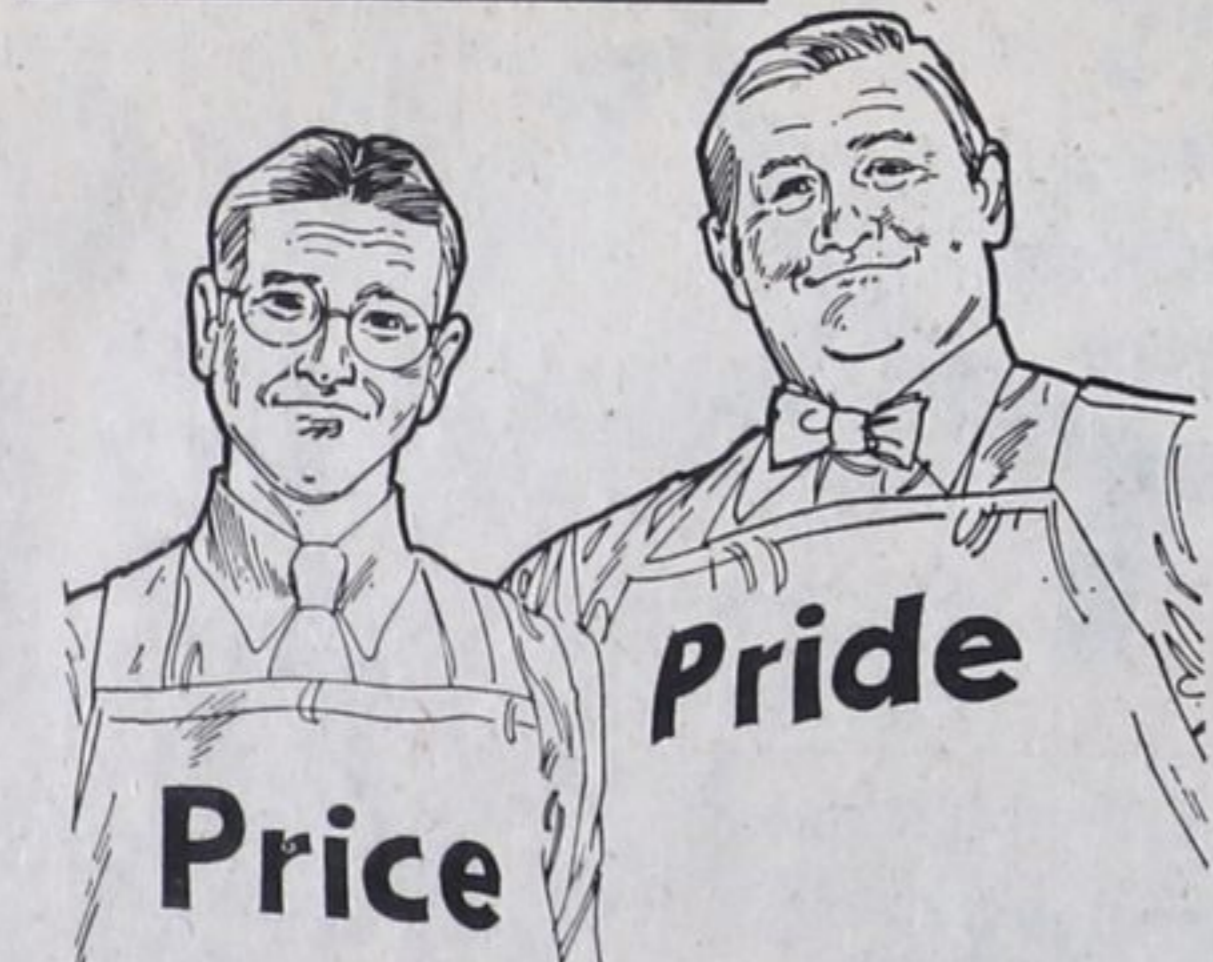
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
