Police look into break-in

Collision

Penetanguishene police investigated an accident which occurred at 8:00 p.m. Sunday, between two cars on Robert Street West at the bridge.

One car, driven by Andre Dubeau of Concession 12, Tiny, sustained \$1,000 damage, and the other, driven by Paul Marion, of Concession 17, Tiny received \$800 damage.

There were no injuries in the accident, and no charges were laid. Police said the two cars went into the slippery turn, and just slid into each other.

At Tiny Council

Lawyer contends petition on water system invalid

Joe Axler, developer of Georgian Bay Estates, came to Thursday's Tiny Township Council meeting for further discussion and approval for constructing a water system on Georgian Bay estates. Mr. Axler submitted a petition to council in 1976 from the residents of Georgian Bay Estates requesting installation of a new water system. Mr. Axler's first request was that the water system be installed under local improvements, then changed his mind and offered to construct the

water system on his own. He asked council to consider purchasing the water system after the installation has been completed.

After considerable discussion, Councillor Maurice questioned Mr. Axler as to what route he was going to take: local improvement or install the water system on his own. Mr. Axler informed council that he would accept either proposal.

At this point John Gammel of Gammel Symons and Rice approached council saying he had been retained by a

group from Georgian Bay Estates, contending, the petition they had signed had been altered, and from his information there is sufficient reason to believe that the petition may not be valid. He suggested to council they set aside the original petition and perhaps have a new one issued, but should not proceed on the original petition. Reeve Darby assured Mr. Gammel that council will take no action on the petition at this time, but that it was up to the lawyers' firm to prove the original petition is not valid.

February, 1977	Interest 3 1/2 per cent
March, 1977	Interest 3 per cent
April, 1977	Interest 2 1/2 per cent
May, 1977	Interest 2 per cent
June, 1977	Interest 1 1/2 per cent

Note: This is equal to 8 per cent per annum calculated from Jan. 1st to June 30th, the estimated date of demand of payment of 1977 taxes.
