## Juveniles win first game against Base Borden

Emery's Electric can not finish better than

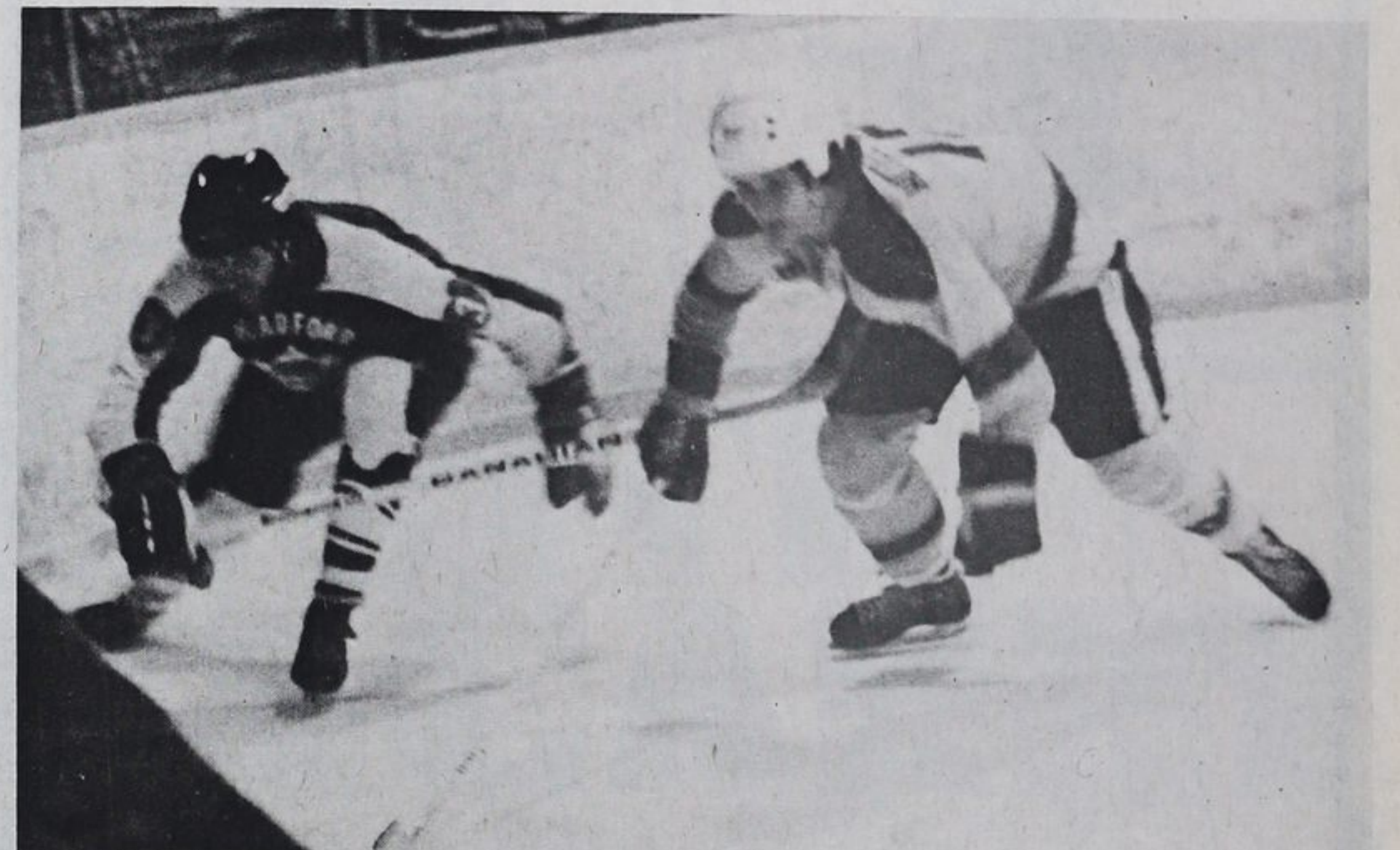
