Vegetable planting

by Agnes Millward Last week I talked about preparing your vegetables which may be planted now. If you don't have your seeds, purchase the ones which I'll mention and achieve that head start on everyone

Potatoes may be planted, if you have the spale; they require a tremendous amount of space to be worthwhile therefore are not practical for the average home gardener. Peas may also go in, without worry of frost and they will even survive a light snowfall. When sowing your peas, scoop a shallow trench about two inches in depth, and the width of your spade, then scatter the seed at random along this trench, cover gently placing wire, stout string or branches on top over which the peas will grow. This method will save precious space while providing several pickings for a family of four. An additional trench will add nicely to the freezer.

Radishes, onions, lettuce and spinach like cool weather to germinate and grow, so put these in now. I recommend that these be planted in half rows at two week intervals with the exception of onions which can be planted all at once.

These vegetables germinate and grow quickly, putting you into a tail spin trying to cope with an abundance of vegetables if too many are planted at one time.

These vegetables also bolt, or go to seed quickly in the very hot, dry months. Onion may be sown early and all at once, thinnings as green spring onions. Purchase a maggot or grub killer for both onions and radishes, dusting in the row as you sow your seeds. This will prevent a disfigured, unappetizing harvest. The grub deterrent is readily available at any store with garden sup-

Parsnip, parsley, carrots, turnips and beetmay be sown in early spring, planting them all at once too. Cook your small carrot thinnings, there is no better taste!

Companion planting Some food for thought is the method of 'companion planting' which is growing together those plants which whose pests either cancel each other out or whose odours repel the pests of others. Plant beets with onions, carrots with peas, celery with beans or leeks, onions with beans, radishes with lettuce, tomatoes with parsley and turnips with peas. The combinations are said to be mutually beneficial to each other in repelling insects.

Try to avoid planting or rotating tomatoes with beans, corn, peas or radishes and celery with carrots as they attract the same pests. 'Companion planting' is a form of organic gardening which could prevent the heavy use of pesticides, of which many are toxic in large doses to us, pets and the birds and bees.


casional spot dance. That's the Junior Teen Dance this Friday and every Friday at the Y admission is .50c. Y membership is not necessary.
