This annual contest involves two students per event from each secondary school in the county. The students competed for accuracy and speed in events of typing, shorthand, machine math, spelling, law, data processing and accounting.

Midland Secondary School was well represented with 25 out of the possible 26 students in

the 13 events. The team efforts resulted in Midland coming in fourth place and Penetanguishene Secondary School came in sixth out of the 12 schools who participated.
