It's not a problem of willful neglect says Nurse Doris Weeks, it's just a matter of knowing. Weeks is the immunization nurse for the Midland Branch of the Simcoe County District Board of Health. She gives needles to the 23 elementary and four secondary schools in Tay and Tiny Townships and has found that a good 60 per cent of the students have missed important

During the first five children parneed munization. If the immunization program for the first five years is not complete the booster shots in following years will not do their job.

After finding that so many children were behind on their needles Weeks decided to do something about it. She's in the process of bringing all the school children up to date on their needles.

program say Simcoe County District Health Unit officials Usually Weeks would just give the booster shots to all the 10 and 15 year olds

in the area but now she's trying to get records of all the students and make sure they're up to date. After visiting three schools last week she found 120 students who had irregularities in their needle records.

When she's not out on the job Weeks works in the Simcoe County District Health office which is located at the back of the Chamber of Commerce building at 578 King St.

A record should be kept by the parents so they know when their children had the shots. The province now recommends a schedule for immunization. It states that infants should have three injections before they are six months old. Each of these injections is a combined shot for diptheria, whooping cough, tetanus and polio. When the baby is between a year and fourteen months it's time for another combined shot for

measles, mumps and rubella. Then at 18 months the baby should receive a booster for diptheria, whooping cough, tetanus and polio. This booster is repreated again when the child is four-and-ahalf to five years.

Another booster is given when the child is ten years and then at 15 years but whooping cough is no longer in the shot. At 20 and every five years to follow adults should get a polio shot.

She is concerned about the low number of adults who attend the clinic and adds that it's never too late to be immunized and if adults are behind in their shots she can bring them up to date too.





