Hwy. 69 test strip confuses some

The new section of Highway 69 between Waubausene and Port Severn is confusing some drivers.

The test strip has two lanes and two paved shoulders. The paved shoulder has a solid white line dividing it and the driving lane. Drivers are supposed to pull onto the paved shoulder to permit faster moving traffic to pass them on the left. These drivers should then move back into the regular driving lane.

The shoulder is not to be used for mechanical breakdowns as unpaved shoulders are. It is also illegal to pass on the right using the shoulder.

O.P.P. Staff Sergeant Dolittle says they have been monitoring the highway. "We have tried to educate the drivers without laying too many charges," he said.

Slow moving traffic such as tractors and farm equipment are permitted to travel continuously on the shoulder.

This type of highway has been used successfully in the Maritimes and is a fairly new development in Ontario. The test strip on Highway 69 was completed in the
