The flu shot must be repeated annually.

Each year, a different flu shot is prepared which contains effective components for most current flu bugs so that one to two weeks following the shot, 80 per cent of those immunized develop a natural resistance which will protect them during the entire flu season. If someone who has been immunized is exposed to the flu, they will either escape the illness completely or have a much shorter and milder case.

Complications stemming from the flu shot are minor and severe complications are rare. Some people do develop a mild flu-like illness beginning about six hours after the




