either or both a shotgun competition or a .22 calibre rifle competition. The idea of the contest is simply to see who can put the most amount of shot into the target from a range of 40-yards, or if a rifle is being used, who can place a shot closest to the target's centre.

Since the target used in the .22 calibre competition is smaller, shooters only fire from 25 yards. They also have the luxury of shooting down an indoor firing range.
