1/2 cup bread crumbs Method: Melt butter in sauce pan. Blend in flour. Remove from heat. Gradually stir in milk. Add water and broth. Cook and stir over medium heat until thickened and smooth. Then add remaining ingredients except melted butter and bread crumbs. Pour into a greased two quart casserole. Combine melted butter and bread crumbs and sprinkle over rice mixture. Bake at 450 degrees for 15 minutes.
