Arena deficiencies to be fixed

opened Centennial Arena has several engineering deficiencies which will have to be corrected.

Acording to Deputy Clerk Mike Owen the biggest problem is with the insulation which Whitney Construction installed

"It's a very glaring error on their part," he said pointing out that the insulation in the roof is inferior to the insulation the contractors specifications called for. The proper insulation, once installed, will save energy which will amount to quite a cost saving to the corporation over the

According to Mr. Owen, Whitney Construction was told of the mistake some time ago but they haven't done anything to correct it.

"So we are seeking quotations to have the job done." Mr. Owen said adding that Whitney Construction will be billed for the work and "it won't cost the taxpayers a

"We have a number of

Midland's newly other deficiencies in the arena," Mr. Owen commented. He said 90 per cent of them are minor compared to the insulation problem. These deficiencies have been pointed out by the town's engineering consultants.

Mr. Owen explained that problems occur whenever a large building is constructed. He compared it to buying a new car which has to be serviced several times before all the bugs are ironed out.

"We maintain a holdback of 15 per cent," Mr. Owen pointed out. He said this money is used to correct any problems that may arise once the

building is completed. "It's a standard sort of thing," he added.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

this policy is not stated explicitly in the municipality's zoning by-law. Consequently the purpose of By-law No. 1978-29 is to clarify the town's position on this matter, to make it quite clear that no new buildings can be built on lanes at the moment.
