

Concerned citizens discuss child abuse

admit that child abuse exists in our community, and a group of concerned citizens met last Wednesday night to discuss ways of preventing this most dreadful of offences.

Sobering statistics were

presented to the 45 people who met with Chairpeople Deni Ashby and assistants Janice Polley and Ken Heron. Children highest risk group. In one year, 10 "hard core" child abuse cases were reported in our community, but this number represents only a tenth of the number of cases which go unrecognized or unreported.

Citizens are obliged, by law, to report evidence that a child has been maltreated, and there is consideration of legislation which would impose a penalty on those who are aware of child abuse, but who do not

for those who report situations where children are suffering from maltreatment, but there filled out forms indicating may be cases where their particular areas of observers will be requested to appear in few weeks, a co-ordinator court. This happens for the Child Abuse


