Concerned citizens discuss child abuse

People have begun to admit that child abuse exists in our community, and a group of concerned citizens met last Wednesday night to discuss ways of preventing this most dreadful of offences. Sobering statistics were presented to the 45 people who met with Chairpeople Deni Ashby and assistants Janice Polley and Ken Heron. Children under three years are the highest risk group. In one year, 10 "hard core" child abuse cases were reported in our community, but this number represents only a tenth of the number of cases which go unrecognized or unreported.

Citizens are obliged, by law, to report evidence that a child has been maltreated, and there is consideration of legislation which would impose a penalty on those who are aware of child abuse, but who do not report it.

Anonymity is promised for those who report situations where children are suffering from maltreatment, but there may be cases where observers will be requested to appear in court. This happens rarely.

Although detection of child abuse is important, prevention is the really significant part of any program which hopes to curtail it. At three workshop sessions at the Wednesday night meeting, several excellent suggestions surfaced.

Because loneliness is a condition shared by most parents who abuse their children, a store front drop-in centre or

The Homecoming party at Midland Secondary

School on May 27 has been arranged to honour three retiring teachers, who have among them, racked up a total of 111 years in the classroom. Connie Cardenas, John Dalrymple and Frank Powell will be honoured at a special presentation at 3 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

Organizers have purposely kept the formalities down to a minimum. "We think the social aspect is most important," says MSS principal W.F. Brown. "The returning graduates will want a time to talk to one another, and certainly they'll all want to have a chat with their old teachers."

After the brief ceremonies, guests will be able to walk down "Memory Lane" where a selection of photographs of school activities through the years has been mounted. A feature of the display will be a complete set of year-books, most of which are from the collection of J.J. Robins.

Back in the '50s, when every high school had a cadet corps, teacher Frank Powell took some movies of Midland students in action, and these will be shown at the reunion-retirement party.

A dance at the Country Mill will complete the celebration. Twelve of the teachers on staff at MSS are former students of the school - an almost unique situation. Edith Clark is one of these, and she along with Murray Lovering, Ron Tomlinson, David Chambers, Audrey Hamilton, and Bob McVean began early in the year contacting former students. They placed advertisements in weekly newspaper across the province and sent out 1,200 letters of invitation.

"We've had a wonderful response," says Edith Clark. "We're especially pleased with the number of replies from students who graduated in the 20s and 30s. I had eleven phone calls in one night, in response to a newspaper ad, and we've had more than 40 personal replies, as well as 350 responses from our letters."

For Edith the replies have been particularly gratifying, because contact has been made with old friends and classmates.

This is the first homecoming MSS has ever had, but the enthusiastic response may indicate that another ought to be held in the future. "And if it is," says Edith Clark with a smile, "we'll be ready for it. We're starting a file of alumni cards."
