In all, Clark picked up four points in the game while Dobie added six to his personal total.

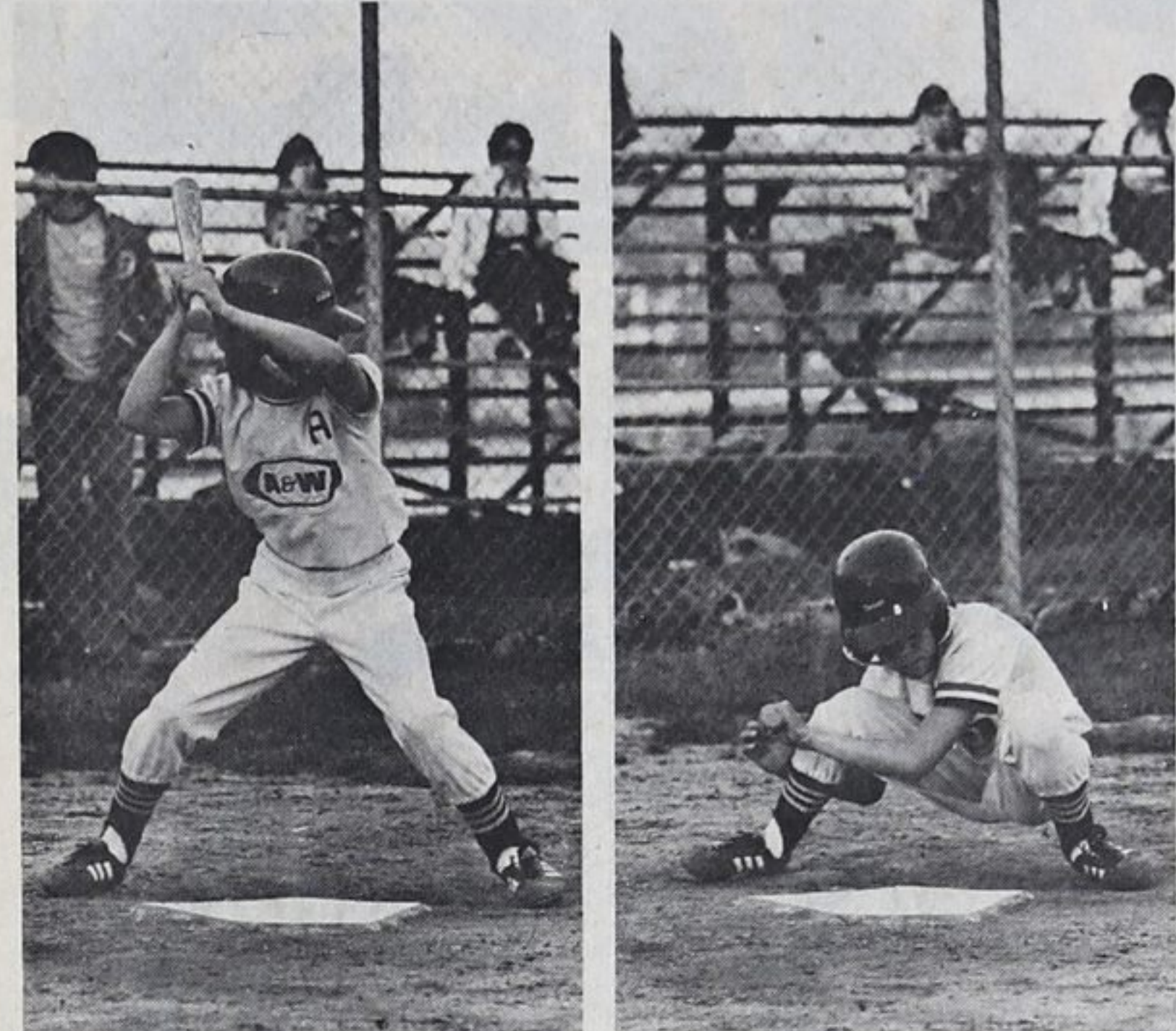
Long night for Midland Lacrosse Bantams

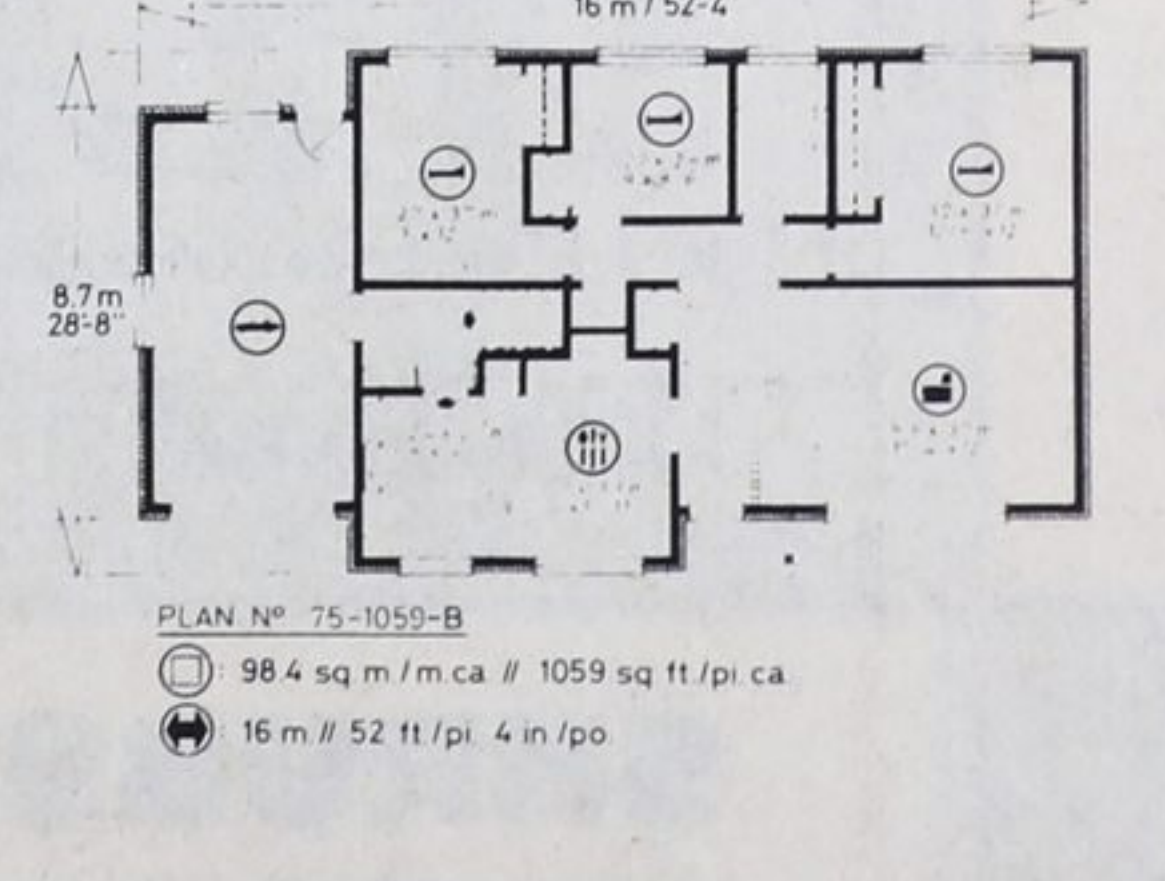
