

# Toronto youth sentenced for IGA break and enter

An 18-year-old Toronto youth was sentenced to a total of four months in jail and 12 months probation for break and enter and

assault causing bodily harm in Provincial Court on Monday morning. Miles William Ford, of Eglinton Avenue in Toronto pleaded guilty to the charges. Judge Norman Nadeau sentenced him to two months on the assault charge and two months for break and

enter. He also stipulated that Mr. Ford must submit to psychological and psychiatric testing if the probation officer feels it's necessary. According to the police report Mr. Ford and a friend travelled from Jackson's Point to Penetanguishene on

March 3, 1978. They arrived in Penetanguishene early in the morning. At 5:50 a.m. they broke a window to get into the IGA store on Poyntz Street. An alarm went off at Huronia alarms and the owner of the store was called. He caught one of the boys

and the other one attacked him allowing his friend to escape. The police only managed to apprehend Mr. Miles. It was days later when his accomplice was apprehended. P. Harris, Miles Ford's lawyer told the court that Mr. Miles life has not been an easy one. He said

his father has a bad heart condition and could not be in court and his mother works and could not miss another day. He said his client has no vocational skills and has difficulty getting jobs. He also pointed out that Mr. Ford has contacts with people in the Regent Park area

of Toronto. "These contacts have lead him into difficulty," Mr. Harris said. Mr. Harris presented the Judge and the crown attorney with a copy of a pre-sentence report prepared when Mr. Ford was before another court in February. He was

given a conditional discharge on a charge of assault with intent to resist arrest, failure to appear and failure to comply. He was put on 18 months probation for these charges. Referring to the report Mr. Harris told the court

that his client had been beaten in Toronto and his mother felt that he suffered brain damage in the scuffle. "His mother suggested he has always been mild mannered," Mr. Harris said adding that after he was beaten, "he could not longer control his temper."

being charged in Penetanguishene Mr. Ford was given a conditional discharge and put on probation. "He obviously totally disregarded the leniency of the court," he said, calling the assault a violent one. "His attitude toward crime should not be dealt with in any light fashion," Mr. Horton said. Judge Nadeau told the court he had taken into consideration that Mr. Ford had been in jail for two months when he sentenced Mr. Ford.

## Quiet weekend for OPP

After spending a hectic weekend during the Victoria Day Holiday, Midland OPP got somewhat of respite this past weekend, with officers being called to investigate only nine accidents, all of them a minor, unreportable nature.

While the accident statistics show a welcome decline, many cottagers are still finding that their premises were visited by unwelcome guests during the winter. For instance, between November 15 and May 13, someone broke into the Honey Harbour cottage of Henry Lee of Stouffville. The thieves stole a large assortment of cedar wood and nails, valued at \$250.

**Island B and E**  
Between October 10 and May 27, the Island 99, Georgian Bay township cottage of Lewis Breithaupt was entered, and thieves made off with a Citizen's Band radio set. The value of the stolen property is not known. Police continue to investigate.

**Interior B and E**  
Thieves with an eye for interior decorations entered the Concession II Tay Township cottage of Jerome Vingilis, Islington, between April 22 and May 27, stealing \$150 worth of furniture and rugs. The investigation into the theft continues.

**Stolen Property**  
Between March 18 and May 5, thieves literally emptied the Georgian Bay Township cottage of Jack Twaites, Willowdale.

According to police, they forcibly entered the premises, and made off with a lawn mower, an air compressor, a gas barbecue, a portable air conditioner, a battery charger, an electric drill, a wheelbarrow, and a quantity of assorted tools. Police are awaiting a value estimate on the stolen property.

**Willful Damage**  
Vandals struck a change house at Balm Beach over the weekend, saddling Tiny Township taxpayers with what will probably turn out to be an expensive repair bill. Police say the vandals smashed in doors, screens, and windows. The incident is still under investigation.
