Woods named vice-principal

The appointment of Kenneth Norval Woods as vice-principal of Midland Secondary School was announced last week. Mr. Woods will join David

Chambers, present vice-principal. Woods is a University of Toronto graduate who majored in Geography. He holds a Occupation

Specialist type A certificate, as well as certificates in Industrial Arts and Special Education. From 1959 to 1961 Kenneth Woods taught

elementary school in Sarnia Ontario. The next two years he taught at Oakville High School. He came to Midland in 1974 after 11 years on the staff at Downsview Secondary School.

While at Downsview, Woods was part of a team that took one of the first groups of Ontario Secondary School students to the peoples' Republic of China for a three week visit.

At Midland Secondary School, Kenneth Woods taught science and occupations classes. The appointment of Kenneth Woods to vice-principal of MSS becomes effective in September 1978.

Trophies won at sailing race

Handsome trophies donated by the Town of Midland were presented by Mayor Moreland Lynn to winners in the Midland Bay Sailing Club Open Centennial Race on Saturday.

Later the Mayor officially opened the recently completed MBSC clubhouse, and unveiled the official MBSC burgee, created by Don and Belle McKee. The triangular pennant carries the MBSC logo on a red, black and white ground. Mayor Lynn paid tribute to the sailing club members for the hours of work they put into the creation of the new facility which he characterized as an outstanding addition to the community.

Twenty-seven craft participated in the day-long race to Giant's Tomb and back. Mayor Lynn fired the starter's pistol shortly after 8 a.m. Flukey winds kept skippers and crews on their toes, and by late afternoon, the first boats began crossing the finish line at the town dock.

Race Committee Chairman Gord Teskey announced corrected results at a post race dinner and dance held at the MBSC clubhouse.

Of the 10 craft in A Fleet, Pepper, a 30-foot C and C with Bill and Denise Snyder, Don Sherk and Terry Wells aboard emerged the winner. The Soling Soleil (Tom and Harvey Payne) placed second, and O'Race, a custom yacht skippered by John Haste, was third.

There were 17 boats in B Fleet and Cari, skippered by Rick Szafanski made the best time. Peribar, a Tanzer 28 skippered by Peter Keeping was in second place and Syrena a C and C 25 skippered by David Parsons was in third place.

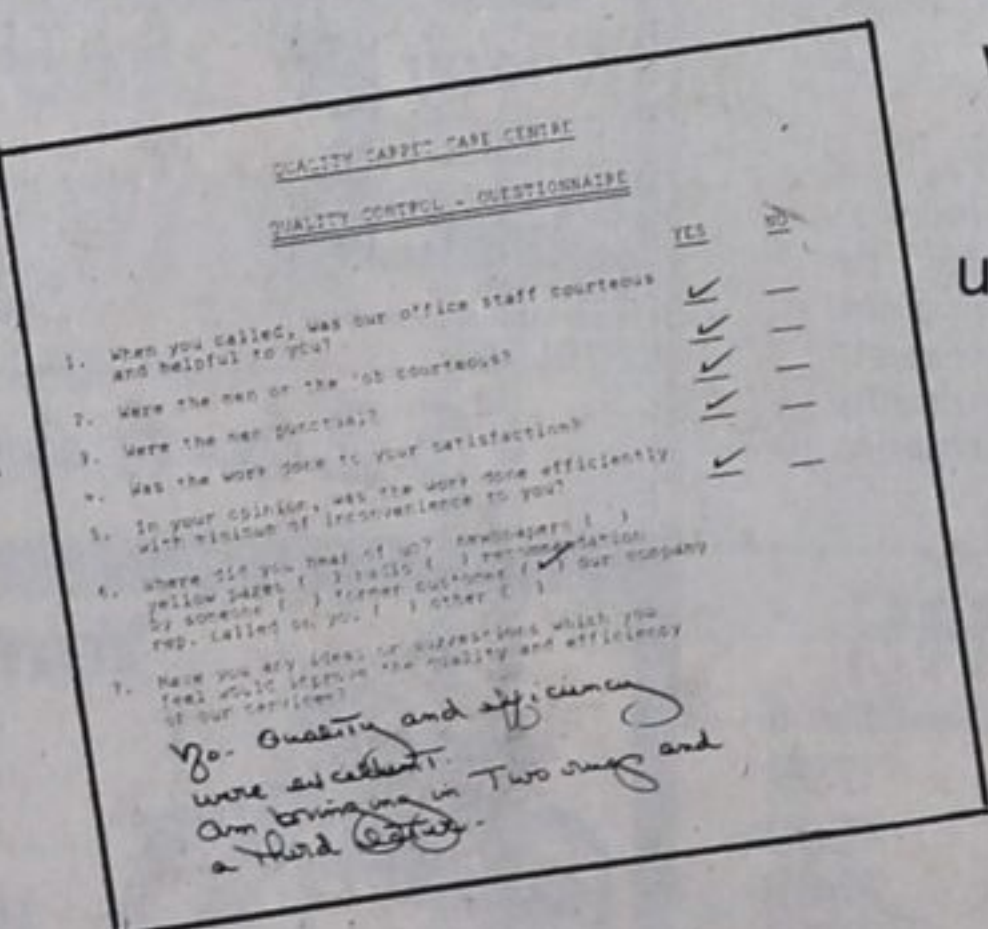

Tiny Township considering Kingswood expropriation

Tiny Township is considering the possibility of expropriating a piece of land in the Kingswood Acres subdivision if an agreement cannot be reached with the land owners.

The township would like to complete a road through Kingswood Acres, north and south, which is divided by a tract of land, located on Concession 19.

In a letter sent to Tiny Council, the owners, lawyer T.G. Jamieson and his sister, W.G. Pridham stated that they wished to meet with council to discuss the matter further.

The owners have previously stated their objections to this proposal. Mr. Jamieson has suggested that improvements to the existing hill road down to Kingswood Acres north would be preferable to the proposed expropriation. Presently road crews for the township have

been maintaining an entrance for the north section of the subdivision. The entrance is situated over a steep hill and the maintenance has

presented difficulties to the road crews.

Council has agreed to a hearing at the next meeting, scheduled for June 29.

Board to review Smith's Camp development

Midland's Planning Board has been requested by the Technical Committee to review development in Smith's Camp on King Street.

According to a Technical Committee report the general manager of the PUC, Art Evans was asked to supply a new water supply lead to the Smith property from the main on King Street.

Fire Chief Francis Miller told the committee that there are no hydrants in the subdivision, the water supply is poor and the equipment the fire department has finds it difficult to maneuver on the roads.
