Effective today Gray Coach is opening its doors to Midland with a new bus terminal.

Located at 527 Bay Street West, in the town near First Street, the modern new facility will be managed by agent John Scott of Huronia Travel.

According to Brian J.
Stewart, director of traffic for Gray Coach, in to serve the people of Midland and the surrounding area that much better, Gray Coach Lines' new terminal will match the service of the com-

pany's \$150,000 (each) buses the company operates.

Open Monday to Thursday from 7:15 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Fridays from 7:15 a.m. to 8:15 p.m., the new terminal will stay open as well on the weekends.

Saturday it will open at 7:15 a.m. and close at 6:15 p.m. while Sundays it will stay open from 11:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m., and that will go for holiday weekends as well

It has taken plenty of planning to locate the new terminal where it

will be housed. The general public is being invited to drop by tomorrow to view the new quarters and enjoy a cup of coffee and a do-

By keeping the terminal open longer, it is the intent of Gray Coach to provide more information to the busing public regarding its multitude of services to Toronto and on other routes the company

"It is a matter of serving the people the best we know how," observed Stewart yesterday morning as finishing touches were being made at the new Bay Street West bus terminal in Midland.

Until such times as passengers become acquainted with the new terminal's Bay Street

West location in Midland buses will continue to use their current route to and from Midland.

both Midland in general and Bay Street West commerce in particular and as such has shown Gray Coach's faith in Midland and its travelling public.

as a township and Simcoe County council politician.


He enjoyed telling stories of how this part of the country was developed prior to and just following the turn of the century.

served in the township and the friends he made over the decades.


