SCBE forks out \$68,000 for new Fr. school site

BARRIE -- Irving Harris, director of education for the Simcoe County Board of Education is pleased with the 'good headway'

the joint working committee has made for purchase 6.8 acres of the Penetang French vacant land from a local high school.

He must be pleased. Wednesday evening the school board agreed to property owner, Mrs. Pierrette MacLeod, to build the French school.

The board will pay \$68,000 for the property.

The land, edging behind houses on Robert Street East up as far as Jefferey Street, is now zoned in the 'Holding' category. The school board must now make application to the Town of Penetanguishene for proper zoning to 'Institutional.' That may take some time.

In the meantime, plans are underway to up Frenchstart language instruction this fall in the continuation wing of Ecole Ste-Croix in Lafontaine. The wing has not been in use since it was closed in June, 1978. It formerly housed the secondary schooluntil June of 1966.

An agreement is being worked now between the Simcoe County Roman Catholic School Board -owners of the school -and the Simcoe County Board of Education.

FLAC member, Basile Dorion says the committee is willing to accept that site, but says they were really looking for something a 'little more central.' He says the continuation wing, which has 'about six or eight classrooms' will temporarily house the French high school students 'the for

shortest possible time." But he says the boards have said the school will be used 'as long as needed.

Re-zoning the newlyacquired property adjacent to PSS may take some time, so it's anybody's guess how long students will remain at the Lafontaine site. Dorion is concerned they may get stuck out there for a long time.

He says the old school does not have a gymnasium which they can use, it lacks a cafeteria and there is no library.

While the county school board continues planning for the French high school, the Concerned Citizens for Bilingual Unity are asking the trustees for some answers to their questions.

Eight members of the citizen's group made a short presentation at the school board meeting Wednesday. Since the bulk of their presentation was in the form of questions, board chairman, Roy Edwards, told them to leave their written comments with the board. They were told they would get an answer 'in the form of a report' from the administration in a few weeks.

time on the weekend.


