Raymond Bailey played Mr. Drysdale, the Clampett's banker. Gordon was Lucy's banker, Mr. Mooney, from 1962 until 1968, when the show was rewritten and he was cast as her brother-in-law and owner of an employment agency.

MONEY MATTERS -Help me out on a money game show. My son says the show we're thinking of was "The \$128,000 Question," and I say it was "The \$64,000 Question." We have a little bet on this. - Dorothy Black, Pemberville, Ohio.

The first of the big-money quiz shows was actually "The \$64,000 called Question," but as the years went on the prize money was eventually upped to a possible purse of \$256,000 - four times the original amount. But the show kept its original title until the quiz show scandal knocked it off the air in 1958.


