**Centennial  
celebrations  
for Wyevale**

In just over one week the Tiny Township community Wyevale will be marking its centennial.

100th birthday party special events have been planned for both Saturday, July 19 and Sunday, July 20.

Highlight will be a dedication of a centennial garden which will follow a 12 noon parade in the hamlet.

There will be a baseball tourney, displays and concessions.

Sunday there's to be an open air church service and entertainment provided by a Scottish choir direct from Glasgow, Scotland.

It will be the third municipality in North Simcoe to celebrate its 100th birthday in recent years.

Two year's ago it was Midland's turn while last year the folks on Christian Island celebrated its community's 100th birthday.

**'Glorious 12th'  
parade  
tomorrow**

The Battle of the Boyne, fought 290 years ago tomorrow, will be commemorated tomorrow in various parts of the world where the Orange movement is alive and well.

One such place will be Elmvale where the Orange Lodge will mark its centennial as part of the day-long festivities.

Starting at 8 a.m. tomorrow a baseball tourney will get off the ground at the community arena ball park.

From 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. there's to be a LOBA luncheon at the arena then from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. there's to be a massive parade with bands and marching contingents making their way through Elmvale from all parts of the province and from beyond.

There will be speakers at 4 p.m. along with a draw and from 5 p.m. to 6 p.m. more sports.

A refreshment patio will be set up at the arena from noon until 1 a.m. Sunday.

The 'Glorious 12th' tomorrow will see Elmvale double in size to mark the double-header (the local lodge's 100th birthday and the 290th anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne).

**Petition  
presented to  
village council**

PORT MCNICOLL — A petition containing the names of a dozen people was presented this week to village council.

It deals with that resident see as a contravention of a municipal bylaw ratified in 1974 which prevents more than one family residing in a single-family dwelling.

Councillors were told of two instances where more than one family is living in a home or homes on Franklin Drive.

Reeve Robin Talbot agreed the matter should be looked into and that the home-owners in question be asked what plans they have for the future otherwise council will proceed with legal action.

In another matter related to housing, council agreed to allow a local resident to retain his fence on town property.

It is understood when the man erected it in the first place he wasn't aware that it was on village-owned land.

In allowing the fence to remain, council will ask the property own to remove the top and bottom rail of the fence so as to allow snow-removal in the winter since it is located near a fire hydrant.

PORT MCNICOLL: Meeting here Tuesday night, members of council agreed to continue appointing its representatives to sit on the board of Huronia District Hospital.

Council was informed of the poor attendance of certain members and suggested that in future the problem could be solved by people elected at large placed on the board or to make all members of council ex-officio members.

Councillor Pat Armstrong felt council should continue its present policy of appointing members while Reeve Robin Talbot agreed if members weren't showing up for board meetings that they should be replaced.
