A Public Meeting to hear submissions and comments on briefs previously submitted will be held in

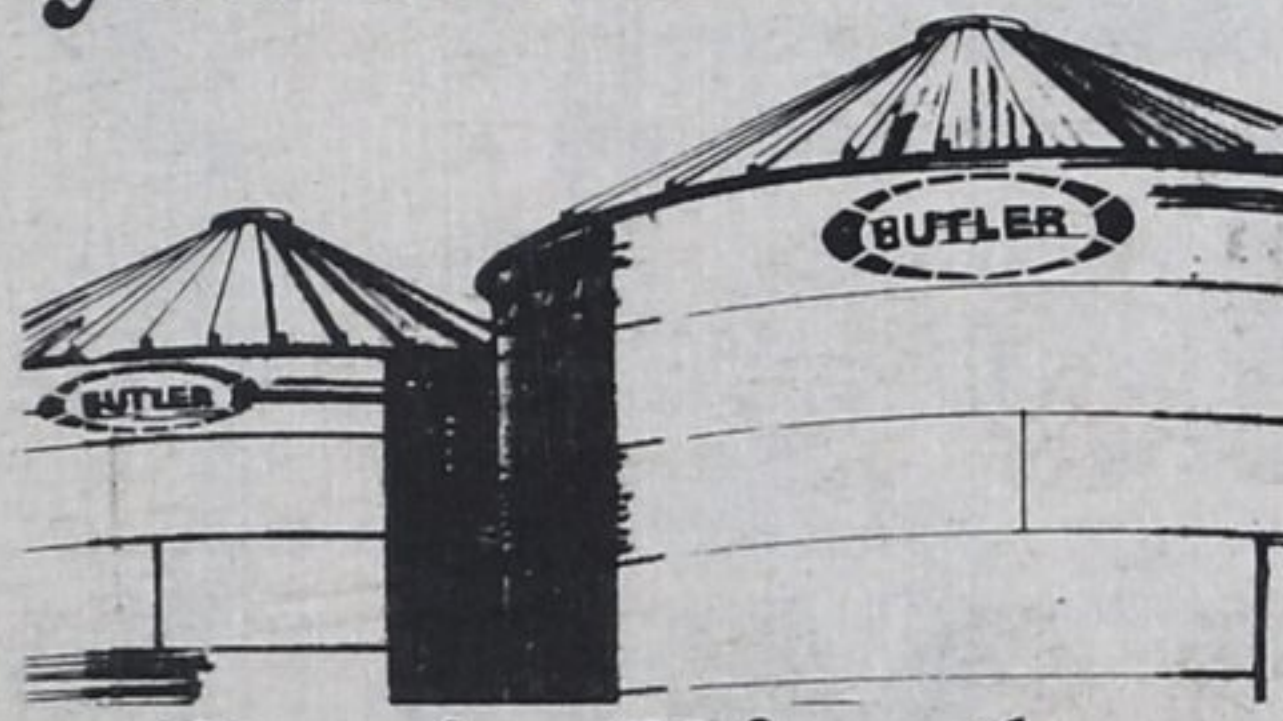

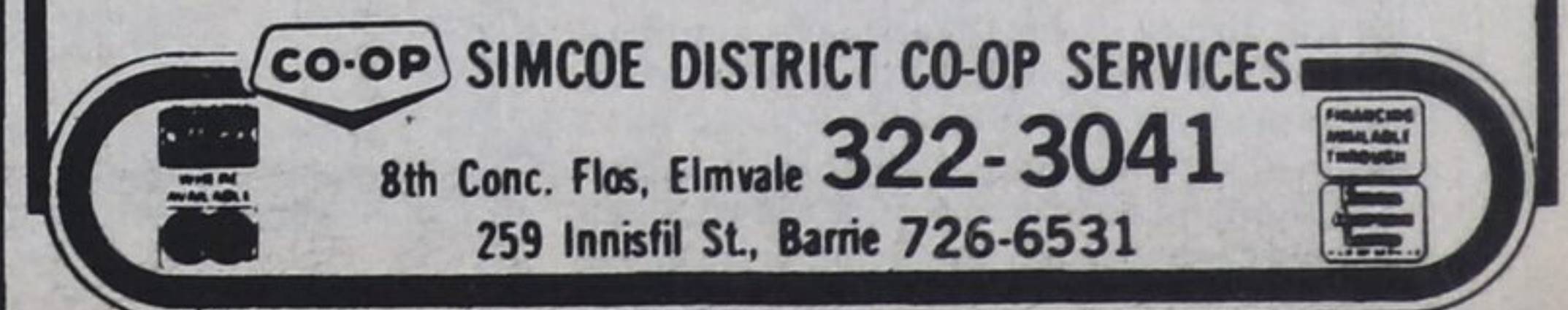
