

Civi-cycle awards presented

Hein Pause also received a medal for being the oldest rider in the event, while Bruce Ladouceur claimed the medal for being the youngest rider present that day, at the age of seven years old.

Mike Tinney, senior advisor for the organization felt it could have turned out better, but feels everyone who participated deserved a round of applause for their part in the event.

Everyone at the club seemed to know who was going to win the three-day 54 hole event, and, to say the least, it

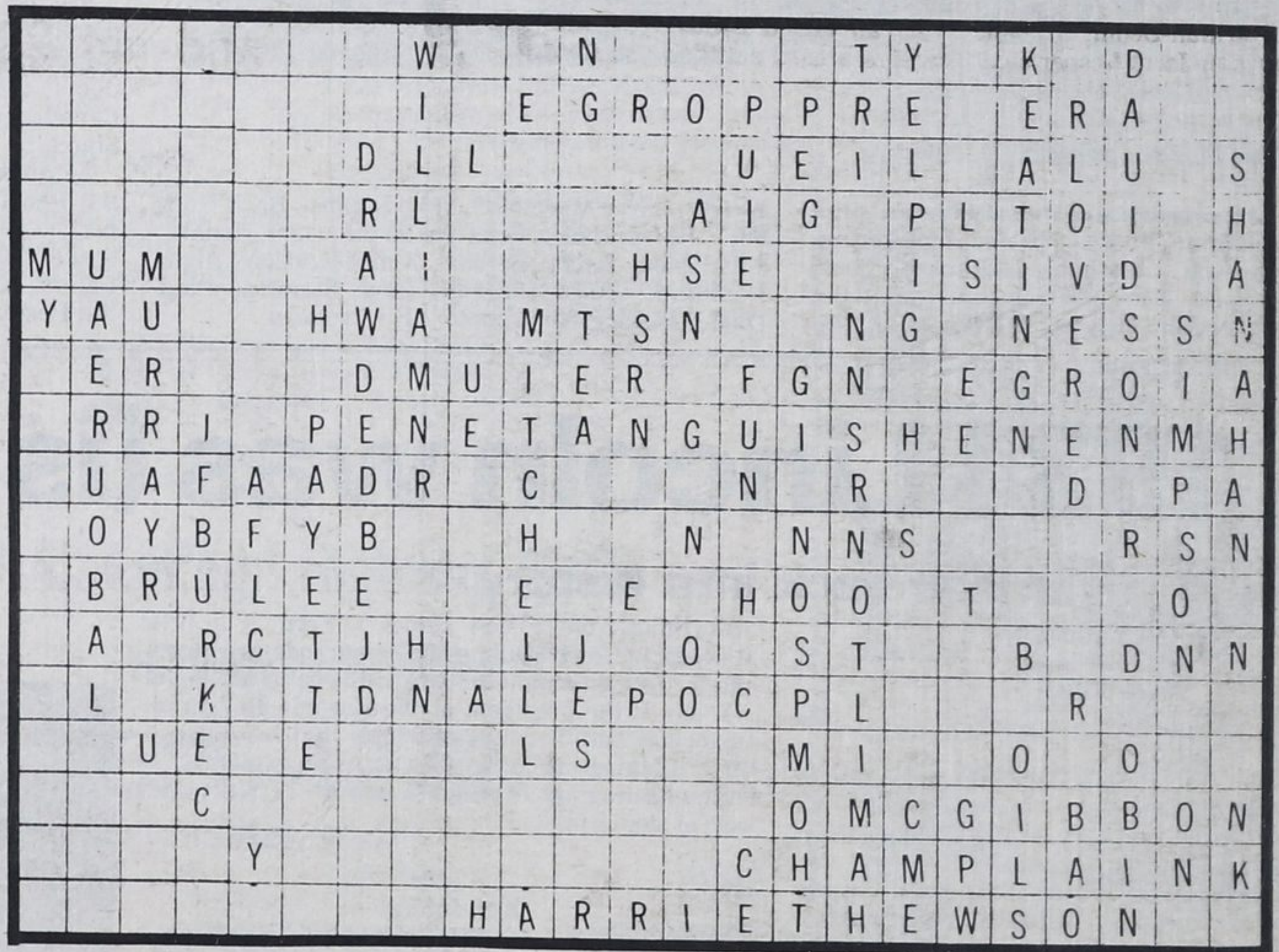
had a dramatic effect on the odds.
