Midland's Tiny-Tay Agricultural Society's Annual Fall Fair is set for Sept. 12 and 13 although as in past years, preparations will be well underway on the 11th.

Barrie's started yesterday and continues

through to Aug. 24.

It attracts thousands from all over the province since its midway is probably the second biggest in Ontario next to the one at the CNE.

London's Western Fair, Sept. 5-14 is a dandy as is Collingwood's on Aug. 29-Sept. 1.

The above mentioned machinery will be on display at the Coldwater Fall Fair on Saturday, Sept. 27 along with a large variety of other antique farm machinery.

Jim's design was one of over 17 entries received. It depicts four Ojibway Indians, canoeing on the Coldwater River, with the grist mill in the background.

The design will be imprinted on the Chain of Office and also on the official seal and all letterheads of the Village. Don Maltby of Coldwater and Patricia Koch of Honey Harbour were runners-up.
