

# Highway 69 scene of two fatal crashes

A Barrie man is dead following a grinding two-car crash shortly before 2:30 a.m. Saturday on Highway 69 just north of Highway 412.

James McCullough, 25, of 75 Christie Ave., Barrie, was a passenger in a car being driven by Kenneth Fitchett of Toronto.

McCullough died of injuries he sustained in the collision which resulted after the Fitchett auto and one being driven by Antonvie VanHoooydonk, 30, of St. Catherines came into collision.

There were eight persons in the St. Catherines car at the time. Most received a variety of injuries.

Fitchett has been charged by Midland OPP with impaired driving and driving while under suspension.

And a Mississauga man died in a two-vehicle accident on Highway 69 just south of the Nicholson Sideroad in Georgian Bay township Sunday morning.

No charges were laid in the accident that took the life of 21-year-old Michael Majewski.

Majewski was northbound by himself on the highway at 2:20 a.m. when his vehicle was struck by one driven by Kenneth Woolley, 19, of Huttonville.

OPP say Majewski entered a curve, continued in a straight line into the southbound lane, bounced off guideposts on the west shoulder, and veered back across the highway into the path of Woolley's vehicle.



## Wanted man

A province-wide search continues this week for Dean Wright, 22, of RR 1, Midland who escaped more than a week ago from the Mental Health Centre at Penetanguishene. Wright is described as being six feet tall, weighing 180 pounds. He has red, curly hair, brown eyes and fair complexion. When last seen he was wearing a black T-shirt with a crest on the back and blue jeans. Wright had been at MHC for psychiatric assessment after being transferred there from the jail at Parry Sound.

# Boat smashes sending five to PGH

A boat that struck a retaining wall known as Asylum Point off Penetanguishene Mental Health Centre, Sunday evening, was destroyed and its five occupants sent to hospital, Midland OPP

report. Joan Brown of Toronto, 22, was transferred to Toronto Western Hospital from Penetanguishene General with a possible fractured leg and pelvis. Another of the five

passengers, John Bland, 23, of Islington, was taken to Penetang General with lacerations and a sprained left leg.

The driver of the 16 foot homemade plywood ski boat, David Prowse, 23, of Toronto, suffered a sprained left leg and lacerations to his legs and nose. He was taken to Penetang General.

The three remaining passengers were taken to Huronia District Hospital. Edward Piwowski, 23, of St. Catharines, sustained a fractured right cheekbone. David Lee, 25, of Islington, had minor abrasions to his face, and Mary O'Ryan, 23, of Toronto, also received minor abrasions.

OPP say that Prowse lost his way returning to a campsite on Beausoleil Island from Grandview Beach near Port McNicoll.

He entered Penetang Bay by mistake, obtained proper directions, and ran into the retaining wall while leaving the bay.

Prowse has been charged with the dangerous operation of a vessel.

## \$9 million-plus wing for Orillia hospital

Soldiers' Memorial Hospital in Orillia is to receive a new \$9,156,554 wing.

Health Minister Dennis Timbrell and Gordon Smith, MLA for

Simcoe East announced today that the new wing will include 76 beds for intermediate cardiac care, medical care and intensive care. Space also will be provided for

audiology, speech, occupational and physiotherapy, offices, a central service for hospital supplies, and the admitting department.

Artifacts and memorabilia, displayed in the main lobby as a memorial to Canadian soldiers killed in action, will be moved to a chapel to be built in the new wing.

The ministry of Health will finance two-thirds of the project cost. The work will be done by Bradsill Limited Construction, of Toronto. Construction will begin immediately and is expected to be completed within the next two years.

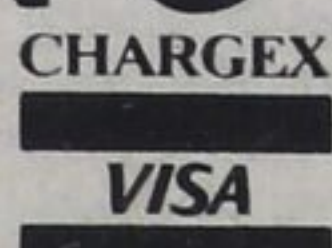
