

St. Joseph arrangement unfair

Simcoe County and separate school board representatives were scheduled to meet last night to consider a brief from parents concerned about the arrangement by which the two boards share Penetanguishene's Ste. Croix School.

Vola Carriere, speaking for a committee jepresenting, she said, the majority of parents of children attending St. Joseph School, said yesterday the parents feel the separate school students have been space out of proportion to their number.

The lower grades of St. Joseph School have been across the street from St. Joseph School in Ste. Croix School. This fall the Roman Catholic Separate School Board moved in, to share the school.

Carriere said her group doesn't mind sharing the school, but that if sharing is to be done, it should be done fairly.

There are 174 St. Joseph students in eight classrooms, and 50 or less St. Louis students

in five classrooms, she said. Carriere and other parents were going to attend Wednesday night's Simcoe County Board of Education meeting and explain their position. Because of a call before the meeting Wednesday informing the group of last

night's meeting, the delegation cancelled. Carriere stated her group felt the boards should be given a couple of weeks to assess the situation. Her group will wait and see what action will be taken in response to its concerns, she said.

189 pints of blood parents feel collected at clinic

Although disappointed by the results, officials from the Huronia Branch of the Red Cross say they'll host another blood donors' clinic in the town at a later date.

A total of 189 pints of blood was collected Wednesday Penetanguishene Secondary School where the Red Cross and members of the high school's students' council teamed up to host the area event.

Students are credited with helping out with registrations and providing refreshment.

An official from the local branch of the Red Cross, Sandy Boucher, noted that during the past 10 days in Toronto, similar clinics had fallen off as well. In one instance only four donors showed up.

Organizers were pleased with the number of new faces who appeared for the first time at the Penetanguishene clinic.

Oakley was charged with failing to yield to traffic on a through highway, after the car he was driving collided with another car at the corner of Lorne and Robert Streets in Penetanguishene.

The driver of the second car was Diane Bugow, 35, of Sixth Street in Port McNicoll and though there were no injuries in the accident, Bugow's car suffered \$350 damage while the Oakley vehicle recovered \$400 damage.
