Unique program set for MHC thanks to York University

York University, of Toronto will be offering full credit university courses this year at the Mental Health Center in Penetanguishene, beginning the week of Oct.

The courses, basic psychology and the Sociology of Formal Organizations are to be offered to staff of the centre and the public at large and will be taught in the classroom of the centre's Administration Building.

The courses are the

result of consultations between York and representatives at the M.H.C. and will be offered as part of York's outreach program. This program is one through which York University offers credit courses in communities that do not have post University facilities but which show an interest and or a need for certain types of programs.

There are prerequisites for either course other than being eligible for University enrollment, and Dr.

The Community Services Team of the Mental Health Centre in Penetanguishene will be holding open house, at their new centre today and tommorrow from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.The team which is comprised of personell with specialties in various fields have just recently moved into the newly renovated what once was the former residence of the hospital Superintendant.
