OPC not probing police

Penetanguishene Mayor Gil Robillard and Deputy-reeve Frances Amant were questioned this week about recent reports by some Ontario media which linked Penetanguishene police with an Ontario Police Commission investigation into the Tillsonburg police

department.

Expressing concern over the "lack of assessment" by those making the reports, Mayor Robillard said, when someone suggests OPC is investigating something, they just lump everything into one category.

Referring to the involvement OPC's

here, the mayor said what went on a year ago was an Adequacy Survey, conducted to see if the force is adequately staffed, properly outfitted; whether their facilities are adequate and also whether the police and council are doing everything they can to provide proper service. He said the same type of thing is done in many departments, not only to monitor the departments performance, but to assist the department in determining its strengths and weaknesses.

"There is a heck of a difference between what's happening in Tillsonburg and what poor o l d

Penetanguishene requested,'' said Robillard.

He added, the investigations in Tillsonburg were dealing with some very serious charges and said, "that's definitely not what was going on in this town."

Deputy-reeve St. Amant heard reports on television, and said she "found it rather amazing we'd be categorized in the same bundle of wax as Tillsonburg."

Commenting on the more innocent nature of the local OPC Adequacy Survey, she stated there was "no resemblance" Tillsonburg to the situation.

She also mentioned that following the reports, she went to see PPD Chief John Geere and explained her disappointment with the news reports and said she certainly had no part in giving out such reports, the validity of which were, in her opinion, in question.
