## Additional NCO is good decision

WE'RE PLEASED an additional NCO has been promoted by Midland council to the town's police force.

The recommendation to operate the force with four sergeants was made months ago in an Adequacy Survey conducted by members of the Ontario Police Commission called in to assess MPD.

Although many policemen, councillors and no doubt the general public hoped the OPC report would contain more recommendations than it did, one of the proposals contained in the OPC document was the need to have one NCO on each platoon.

This has now been finally achieved with the appointment of long-time police Const. Marcel Dorion to

the rank of sergeant.

The 47-year-old officer has 24 years of police work to his credit, 11 in Midland and the remainder with Penetanguishene Police Department where he held the rank of sergeant before joining MPD.

We are pleased the police force here has now the required number of NCOs.

This should help reduce the pressure on our police chief and allow him to be even more visible in those areas where his expertise can be put to the best and fullest use.

Council's decision to go with a fourth sergeant as recommended by the OPC was the proper step to take...

The force itself will benefit from such a move in the long run.

All pensioners on limited income needed, and were led to expect, that your Government would respond to the higher costs they all face.
