

Bill Gibson, for Tay council, promises to be accessible to citizens

Bill Gibson of Tay Township has been nominated for election as a councillor to run in the Nov. 10 municipal election in Tay.

Since the last day for filing nomination papers on Oct. 20, dozens of Tay residents have come to him to offer their help and support in his campaign. his news

release says.

Bill Gibson says he is "overwhelmed by the extent of the unsolicited support received and will work hard and long to justify that support once elected."

He has been out knocking on doors every night and hopes to cover virtually all of the Township before election day.

Administration
The husband of Mary Gibson, administrator of the local Contact Information Centre, Bill Gibson has two children, Dr. John Gibson and Mrs. Helen DeCarli, both of whom are married with families and reside in Tay also.

Bill has been active in business in the food service industry for over 30 years since he served as a captain in the Royal Canadian Artillery overseas in World War II.

As a successful and conscientious businessman he has never backed away from long hours or hard work.

He says he is "anxious to apply this same dedication and hard work on Council to represent the best interests of all Tay residents."

He claims that as a councillor, he would

bring his abundant financial and administrative experience to the deliberations of Council.

He has the qualifications and ability to contribute to and co-operate with Council in what he sees as its main tasks in the early 1980's... "maintaining existing services at a high level, keeping taxes in line by tight budgeting on current expenditures, and planning well for the future of the Township and its residents."

Asked if he was making any promises, Bill Gibson said "I am making two only...I will make myself accessible to hear our citizens' individual concerns and I will work hard and long to conscientiously represent the best interests of all the people of Tay Township."

Gibson is also active in numerous community organizations, both as a leader and as a worker.

He explains why he is involved this way, "You cannot sit back and wait for others to make good

things happen. You can't take all the benefits our society has to offer without giving time and effort in return.

"We must all make whatever large or small

contribution we can to make our community an even better place to live.

Wanting to take part in serving the people of our municipality on council is a commitment to that belief."


Price for adults for the two subscription plays is \$6. Students pay half price.
