In an interview yesterday, fire chief Maurice pointed out that although a similar incident occurred at the Wyevale School on Thursday evening, where rags and gasoline were thought to have been used to start the blaze, the Lafontaine school fire has been seized upon by some media because of the controversy over the separate French high school issue.

The Wyevale school fire is also under investigation by the OPP, and is being viewed as a Hallowe'en prank,
