

\$2,000 more need

Council wants Jaycee drive to be a success

Midland council has recommended to the next council that it make up, to a maximum of \$2,000, any deficit that might remain in the

\$15,000 that the Midland Jaycees are trying to raise to buy rescue equipment for the Midland fire department.

Councillor Richard Platt told council Monday evening he believed the Jaycees to be at the moment about \$2,000 short of their

\$15,000 goal. In other business council considered amendment of its recent bylaw governing the operation in the town of

pinball machines and coin-operated games. The bylaw enforcement officer was directed to meet with the town's solicitor to produce better definitions of terms contained in the bylaw. Deputy-reeve Cai-

herine Dion told council she thinks the hours' schedule in the bylaw should be amended to conform to the affected businesses' normal hours of business. But she did not feel there should be two classes of operators

defined under the bylaw, such that less machines would be allowed in a restaurant, where there is supervision, than are allowed in a billiard hall, where, she said, young people are already hanging around.

Students returning to school

Classes disrupted by Sunday morning's fire at Ecole Secondaire LeCaron, in Lafontaine, returned to normal yesterday, at least for the high school level students. Roland Desroches, a spokesman at Centre

d'Activites Francaises in Penetanguishene said yesterday, classes for nursery school pupils will begin again next Monday, though they will be held in a different room than the one damaged in the weekend blaze.

Second school to be hit by fire

Tiny township fire chief, Guy Maurice, had no comment yesterday on rumours of arson connected with the Sunday night fire at Ecole St. Croix in Lafontaine.

Tiny firemen answered an alarm at 1:50 a.m. on Monday morning at the school, and found a fire at the rear of the building which temporarily houses the Penetanguishene French high school. The alarm was turned in by Jacques Laurin, who was

other teenagers of the fire. The incident is under investigation by the OPP fire marshal.

In an interview yesterday, fire chief Maurice pointed out that although a similar incident occurred at the Wyevale School on Thursday evening, where rags and gasoline were thought to have been used to start the blaze, the Lafontaine school fire has been seized upon by some media because of the controversy over the separate French high school issue.

The Wyevale school fire is also under investigation by the OPP, and is being viewed as a Hallowe'en prank.
