Yesterday morning (1:20 a.m.) they were called out to water down leaves set ablaze near Bayview Public School.

It is thought vandals may have been behind that fire.

At 10:02 p.m. they were summoned to a single car crash in Tiny Township just west of Midland where they extricated a woman from a car that had rolled over.

Monday afternoon, at 2:16 p.m., they responded to a call for help less than a block away from the fire hall. There, at 300 Second St, they put out a small fire on a stove that caused extensive smoke damage throughout the dwelling.

At 3:53 a.m. Monday firefighters battled a stiff house fire at 129

Fourth St. There fire gutted the two-storey building owned by Philip Maxwell before firemen could bring the blaze under control.

Cause of the fire has yet to be determined by members of the fire department in conjunction with an official from the Ontario Fire Marshal's Office who was in the area probing the cause of a fire at a Lafontaine school over the weekend.

No one was home at the time of the Fourth Street fire. Saturday at 5:10 p.m. smoke-eaters answered a call to 222 Queen St. where food cooking on a stove had cause a minor blaze

which was quickly quelled as well.

Friday, Midland firefighters snuffed out a rubbish fire just west of Williams Street shortly before 7:30 p.m. They were called there while mopping up from a green house fire at Smith's Camp.

That alarm was turned into the fire hall at 6:50 p.m., reports Chief Lethbridge.

And at 1:37 p.m. during a partial hydro blackout of downtown Midland, firemen were called to the Yonge Street Civic Centre after a direct alarm to the fire hall had been tripped due to the power interruption.
