Awenda building fire set

The entry office at Awenda Provincial Park was damaged by fire some time between Oct. 28 and Oct. 30. Midland OPP has established that the fire was an act of arson.

Police believe a flammable liquid was poured on the base of the building's east wall and ignited. The damage, about \$2,000, was confined to the east wall.

A ministry of natural resources employee reported the fire to the OPP on Oct. 30.

In the week ending Nov. 3 the Midland OPP investigated 165 occurrences.

Break and enter cases lead the list with 12. In addition there were two cases of attempted break and enter, nine cases of theft, seven cases of wilful damage and eight other cases falling under other sections of the Criminal Code.

Twelve persons were charged with violating the Liquor Licence Act. Eight drivers were found to be impaired. Police laid one charge of driving while suspended.
