There is a good battle place in the middle of the pack these days as well, with a mere seven points separating the sixth to tenth place teams.

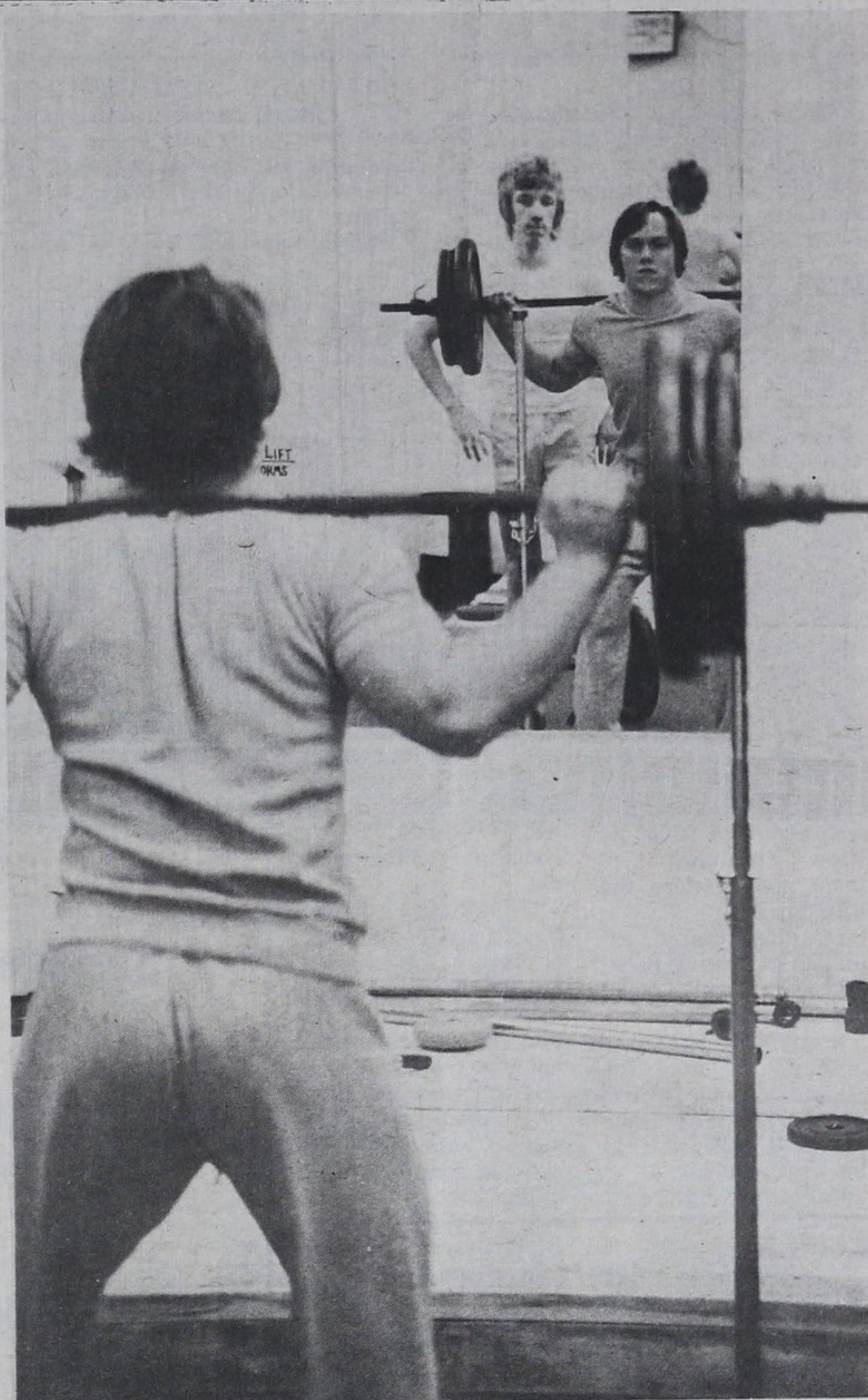
