Councillor Ron Hamelin of Tiny Township is "recovering nicely" in Penetang General Hospital following his recent heart attack, according to Tiny clerk, Guy Maurice. Hamelin had been released from hospital in Toronto earlier, but was re-admitted to PGH and was under intensive care until Tuesday.

#### Overhead Bridge

The overhead bridge at the west end of Robert St. just outside Penetang has been removed by Tiny road crews.

It had been decided to ask for tenders for the removal, but the road crew was available and removed the bridge almost overnight with the help of a hired backhoe and loader.

Clerk Guy Maurice says "People wanted to know if it blew away overnight." Such is not the case, but the township saved a considerable sum by using its own men to do the job. All materials recovered will be stored by the township.

#### Wvebridge Recreation Loan

Tiny township has made a loan of \$3,000 to the Wvebridge Parks and Recreation Committee to cover capital costs of furnace and pumphouse installations.

The Committee is expecting grants from the province to cover the bills in the new year, and provided Ministry of Culture and Recreation guarantees as collateral for the loan.

Tiny Recreation coordinator Bernie LeClair made the request for funds to Council on behalf of the Wvebridge group.

#### Accounts

The following accounts were passed by Tiny Council at their Dec. 10th meeting: General Accounts to December 10th \$116,4560 (including final County levv and garbage contract), Roads \$13,433, Fire (including new "beeper" system) \$27,637, Water \$533, Parks and Recreation \$8,750, Ainley and Associates \$521 and \$2,922 (Georgian Bay Estates), Ainley and Associates \$2,532 (subdivision accounts), 1981 Shoreline Committee remuneration \$1,520, Committee of Adjustment remuneration \$1,530, Wvebridge Recreation Loan \$3,000, Contact grant \$260, Mardon Construction \$1,145 for Perkinsfield sidewalk holdback, Roger Robitaille mileage \$156, Ainley and Associates (Planning Board accounts) \$2,789, Planning Board

remuneration \$1,055, Penetang General Hospital grant \$2,500 for construction costs in chronic care wing.

#### Portable Generators

The Tiny Fire Department has been authorized to buy four portable 1500 watt electric generators. The McCullough generators will be used by each of the Tiny firehalls to power smoke ejectors and search lights. According to fire chief Guy Maurice, these generators were needed

badly at a fire last week.

Total cost of the equipment is \$1,700.

Each member of the Tiny fire department has been provided with an electronic "beeper" to notify them of fire calls.

The \$26,000 system will cut down on response time, and will ensure each firefighter hears the alarm.

#### Building Report

Building starts in Tiny in 1980 were up over 1979, according to building inspector, Larry Crawford. In his annual report to council,

Crawford lists a total of 321 building permits issued in 1980 for an estimated construction value of \$12,071,250.

This figure is up from \$4,738,591 worth of construction in Tiny in the previous year, with the number of permits increased by 13.

It is interesting that rising commuting costs may have resulted in 22 fewer new seasonal dwellings being built in Tiny this year. The number of new permanent dwellings built remains unchanged at 19.

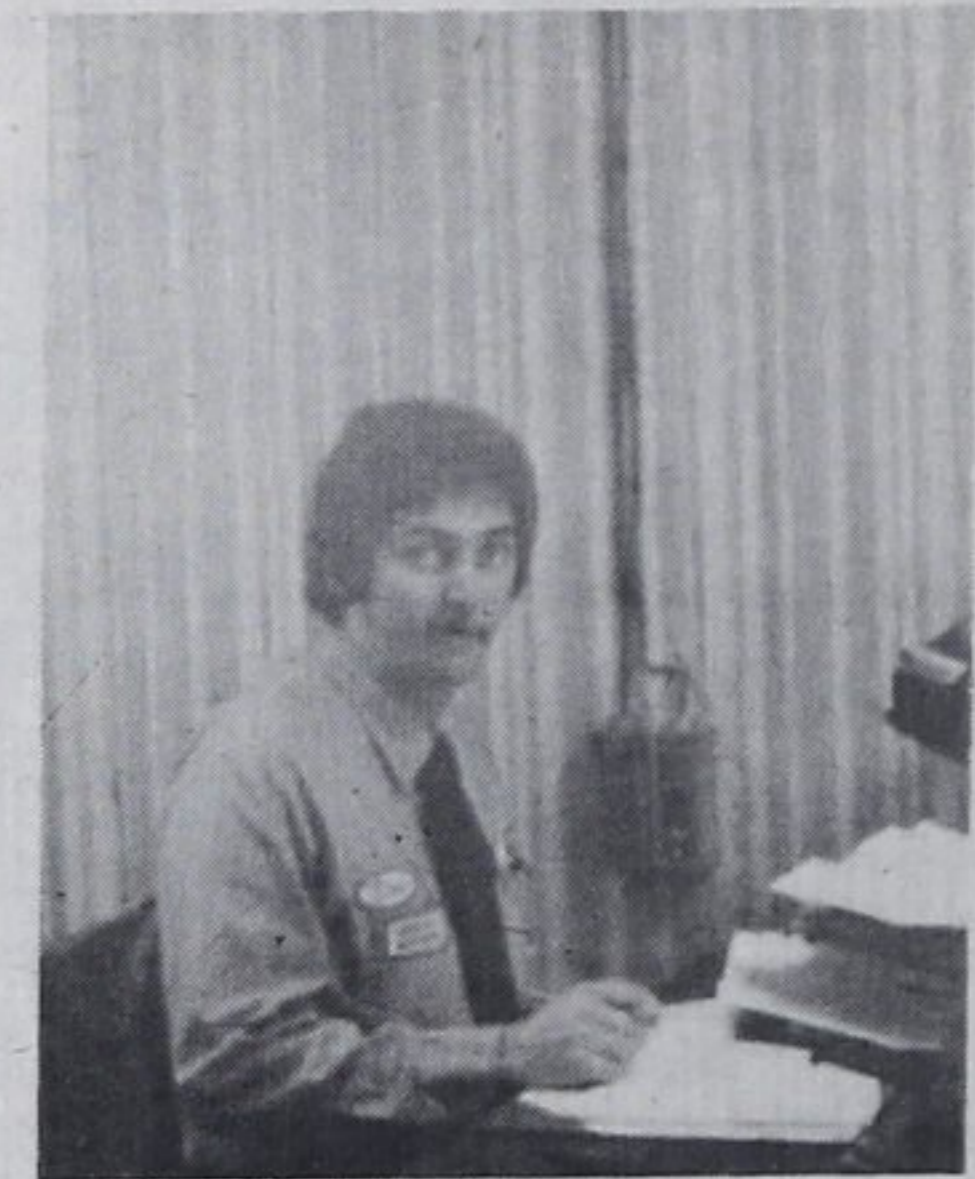
