

EDHS addition on SCBE short list

Elmvale District High School is one of five schools under the jurisdiction of the Simcoe County Board of Education to be given priority in the board's 1981 Capital Expenditure Forecast.

The cost of an addition to EDHS, \$718,000, is the second lowest of the five figures for five schools being sent to the Ministry of Education for approval.

Building an addition to EDHS has been an official priority for the board for the last few

years. The board has also tentatively budgeted \$631,000 for Goodfellow Public School; slightly over \$1.2 million for a new elementary school in Bradford; slightly over \$1.2 million for a new elementary school in Alliston; and slightly over \$1.2 million for a new elementary school in Barrie in Riverwood Farms.

Building in the last four cases would start in 1982 and would be subject to enrolment increases large enough to justify the building of the schools.
